The Portland papers are publishing some very strong protests against the "boxing contests" which have become so popular throughout the state since the enactment of laws prohibiting prize fights. These papers claim that the contests mentioned are nothing other than prize fights, except that they are limited to a lesser number of rounds, which, it is claimed, is no improvement, as long as the decision is given on a knockout. There is no question but that it would be better to extend the number of rounds, but compel the use of softer gloves and base the decision on points of skill by a number of competent judges instead of a brutal "put-down-and-out," making the latter an offense. This would give the admirers of the "manly art" something for their money. As it is under the present rule, any fellow who would rather carry a black eye and a bloody nose for a while than to do a month's honest work can dub himself a boxer and have an understanding with his opponent not to do him up too strongly, and they take the people's money for the privilege of witnessing a mill of four or five rounds that would be a disgrace to a street dog fight.

If men are possessed of the skill and other requisites to make it an object to see an exhibition he may be competent to put up, he should be able, barring the unnecessary punishment, to go thirty or forty rounds of sparring that would be worth the seeing for those who admire the sport, and if he is not, he should not have the cheek to appear before the public.

The arguments in the \$109,000 damage case of the Reynolds Lumber Co. against the Simpson Lumber Co. were concluded Saturday forenoon, and the case submitted to the jury at 10 a. m. Shortly after 1 p. m. the verdict was rendered, granting the plaintiff \$13,956 of his claim.

The idea has occurred to some of our most progressive citizens that with the coming of spring would be an ideal time to start a movement for the betterment of the appearance of our city, and suggest among other things the fixing up in a more uniform style the awnings on the front of many of our business houses. In other towns their entire removal is being demanded by the city councils, but owing to excessive rains here, this would not be advisable, however a much neater appearance could be given to many. The large swinging signs across the sidewalks are being ordered down in the valley towns and the signs written neatly on the glass fronts, making it possible for a tall man to walk erect without endangering his derby.

These are offered as suggestions for our people to think over and act upon as improvements suggest themselves. Acting upon these suggestions might save time and trouble as the council may in the near future see fit to enact an ordinance in accordance with these ideas.

FOUL MURDER IN CURRY COUNTY

Body of Albert Ryan Found Hidden in Brush. Geo. Golliber Suspected

Considerable interest was excited in Curry and Coos counties last week when the dead body of Albert Ryan, late of Del Norte, California, was found by Wm. Moore hidden in the brush on Pistol river in southern Curry. Upon examination of the body it was discovered that there were two deep knife wounds over the heart and that the throat had been cut.

It is known that Ryan recently left Del Norte in company with another party who had also been working in the logging woods of that section and who is suspected of being his murderer.

Sheriff Tyler at once instigated a search for the person suspected and soon located his man, Geo. R. Golliber, working in the Clayton saw mill, below Bandon. He was arrested and brought to Coquille where Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist questioned him and took his statement. He was returned to Curry county where he is to have his preliminary examination.
