## ANOTHER BRICK FOR COQUILLE.

W. C. Laird to Erect a Two Story Building—Other Structures to be Erected Soon.

Still another brick to go up in Coquille. Excavating for the foundation of the second brick building in this city was begun last week and the hauling of dirt goes merrily on. The last start made is by W. C. Laird, the furniture dealer, and the structure is to occupy the lot where the first livery barn built in Coquille stood for so many years, and which was constructed by "Uncle Tite" Willard for Zig Cardwell when Coquille was a very small town, and was later conducted by R. E. Buck, T. J. Little, Geo. Conger and W. H. Mansell, but a year or so ago was considered a back number and was torn down.

This is a beautiful site for a business block, having a south front on one of our business streets, and will be a splendid location for his furniture establishment, which will occupy the lower floor.

The building will be of brick with steel, white pressed brick and plate glass front, will be two stories high and will cover a ground space 50x100. The second floor will be arranged with office rooms in front and a hall 50x60 feet in the rear.

This structure will be put up by Contractor E. G. Perham, who is just now putting the finishing touch on his contract with the First National Bank, which is a full assurance that it will be done in first-class style, and it will be constructed according to the plans and specifications drawn by Architect W. S. Turpen, of Marshfield.

Mr. Laird also owns the lot adjoining the one on which this building is to be erected and runs back to Second street, on which stands the barn occupied by Harry Flanders' team, and which will be renovated and converted into a ware room and workshop to be used in connection with the furniture store.

### Mail Bids to be Let.

The Coos Bay Times reports that Postmaster Curtis is in receipt of notices from the post-office department calling for bids carrying the Coos Bay mail from Roseburg via the old Coos Bay wagon road. The bids are to be in by March 22, and it is expected that a number will be submitted.

"In the advertisement for bids, North Bend is made the terminus of the route. During the summer months, from May 31 to October 1, a twenty-hour incoming schedule is provided and an eighteen-hour outgoing schedule is required. In the winter months, they are allowed twenty-five hours to get the mail in and are allowed twenty-six hours to get the mail out. The outgoing time was extended, owing to the fact that there is no train to make connections with and the extra time is permitted the contractors in order to let their horses take it easy."

### More Railroad Talk.

Seattle, March 12.—The newspapers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho cannot watch too carefully the railroad improvements which will take place in these three states during the next year. Reports from headquarters are to the effect that the transcontinental roads are prepared to spend many hundreds of thousands of dollars in the Northwest beginning with the spring months. This means only one thing and that is that Oregon, Washington and Idaho have reached that state of commercial development where it becomes necessary to give them the very best possible railroad equipment. In Washington alone the Great Northern will spend more than \$2,500,000 during the year 1910 and there is no doubt that enormous sums will be spent in improvement in the other Northwest states. It will be necessary to put lots of money into new rolling stock and other equipment in order to carry on the ever increasing business. James Woodworth, one of the big traffic men of the Northern Pacific and one of the best informed men in railroad circles on emigration matters, was in the Puget Sound country the past week and in newspaper interviews stated that the Hill roads look for the greatest colonial business in their history this year. The settlers are surely coming; they will locate in Oregon, Idaho and Washington and every section of the great northwest will benefit. Never in the history of the Pacific Coast have the prospects of the Northwest been so bright as they are at the present moment.

### Bill to Dispose of Indian Lands.

Washington, March 8.—Senator Chamberlain is prepared to introduce a bill providing for final disposition of all lands in Indian reservations in Oregon. He has gathered information that only 3669 Indians remain on all Oregon reservations, many of whom have had their allotments, and that 1,274,114 acres remain unallotted on three reservations, as follows: Warm Springs, 322,108; Umatilla, 79,820; Klamath, 872,186. The bill is designed as much for the good of Indians as for whites, by giving such Indians the benefits of education, development and self dependence, at the same time releasing to production large areas now closed.
