COOS BAY HOME TELEPHONE COMPANY.

MR. EDITOR:

The other day while in conversation with you about the telephone situation in Coquille and Myrtle Point, I promised to furnish you with a statement of the policy of the Coos Bay Home Telephone Co. in order that your readers may be informed of the exact status of the situation.

The Coos Bay Home Telephone Co. has no controversy whatsoever with the Coquille Valley Telephone Co., that being a movement by the farmers in that community for the purpose, as we understand it, of getting their switching charges and services at a lower cost than this company has been able to furnish them. This company has offered to do switching for the sum of \$3.00 a year, or 25 cents per month per phone on farmers' lines; but they believe they can do it cheaper and get better service, and it is therefore a matter of experiment with them.

Whatever the result may be, the Home Company is in the field for business and to stay, and will continue to improve its plant with the view of bringing its service to a high grade of perfection. For the past six months the company has expended quite a large amount of money in the Coquille Valley and Bandon, and will continue its work and expenditures as the field demands it. If the subscribers of the company are in any way inconvenienced by this movement among the farmers, the company is sorry and is willing to do anything within reason, but under the circumstances it would seem that there is nothing which it can do. So far as the Home Company is concerned, even if its exchanges in Myrtle Point and Coquille should prove to be losing money for the company it will continue to maintain them just the same.

When this Company purchased the telephone property from the old company, a good part of it was nearly worthless. Since then it has been rebuilt in many instances, and practically the whole of it has been gone over and repaired until it now has over \$100,000.00 invested in the plant.

The Home Company is essentially a Home Company, all of its corporate stock, except eight shares, is owned by residents of Coos county and people living on the Umpqua River; and the officers of the institution have repeatedly invited subscriptions to the capital stock by the people of Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Point, and the farmers residing in that vicinity, with a view of having people from all parts of the county interested in it and represented on its board of directors. Its property consists of toll lines in Coos and Curry counties with long distance connection with the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. and exchanges in Myrtle Point, Bandon, Coquille, North Bend, and small exchanges at various other points in Coos and Curry counties.

Thanking you for the opportunity of placing this matter before your readers, and assuring them that it is the aim of the Home Company to satisfactorily serve its patrons in a clean cut business-like manner, I am,

Council Meeting.

Our city council has held several important meetings recently in an endeavor to arrange a number of matters properly. On Wednesday evening of last week the council met and after the usual routine business had been passed upon, the application of J. H. Oerding for a permit to construct a wooden building upon the lot he recently purchased from Mr. Leach and adjoining the one on which Albert Johnson's soda works stands, was brought up for consideration, and after being discussed was referred to the fire committee with the request that they report at that same meeting.

A new fire ordinance was then submitted by Attorney Chase which was thoroughly discussed by the council and passed. This ordinance was carefully drawn by City Attorney Chase, assisted by Attorneys Sherwood and Liljeqvist, and is very much the same as the one recently adopted by the city of Marshfield. It provides that no more wooden buildings will be permitted within the limits of the original townsite of Coquille, as platted by T. B. Willard, consisting of five blocks in the southwest corner of the city.

To this some objections are being made, as several of our citizens were contemplating the erection of wooden buildings within those limits. J. H. Oerding, who had already applied for a permit, seems the most inconvenienced, as he had so recently purchased the lot, and had received encouragement from members of the council that his permit would be granted. This makes it rather awkward for Mr. Oerding and he has decided to defer building, for the present at least.

Street surveys and grades have been a source of some controversy, and Engineers Gould and Kern have been trying to locate the trouble. We understand that there has been a slight discrepancy found in their measuring tapes, which is no doubt responsible for some of the trouble, and which will be righted in time. It has not yet been determined which tape is wrong.

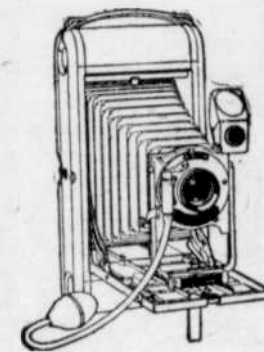
