Mail Bids Advertised For.

The Post Office Department is advertising for bids for the carrying of the mail between Coos Bay and Roseburg over the Coos Bay Wagon Road. It appears that the Middle Fork road will be deserted as a through route entirely. This is very much to be regretted, and no doubt will be, even by those who have been the most severe in their criticisms of the manner in which our mails have been delivered. It is very annoying when mails are not promptly delivered, but if the whole amount of the Coos and Curry county mails is brought in over either one of our mountain roads, as a natural consequence that road will become badly cut up, and at times almost impassable.

At the present time and at the time the route inspector went over the two roads the Coos Bay road looked much better, from the fact that there had been no travel over that line to speak of all winter, and the Middle Fork road had been subjected to a traffic, mail and passenger, requiring from fifty to sixty head of horses, worked to the ex-

tent that some of our people were threatening the proprietors with the laws for the prevention of cruelty to dumb animals, as was the case on the Coos Bay road the winter before. Until we get a rail line of some description, or spend money enough on our wagon roads to build one, the conditions will remain the same, regardless which road is adopted, or if both be used.

Shoots His Wife.

The report came from the Bay yesterday to the effect that P. G. Peterson, commonly known as Wilson Peterson, had shot and mortally wounded his wife. The couple, who are well advanced in years, reside on North Slough, and are well known in the Coos Bay section. It is taken for granted that the shooting was done purposely, as Peterson has been known on former occasions to make threats of violence against Mrs. Peterson. Sheriff Gage started yesterday's train to capture the fugitive and bring him to justice, but at last accounts the would-be murderer was at large.

C. Timmons Drops Dead.

C. Timmons, a prominent business man of Bandon, died suddenly yesterday. We have had no information in regard to Mr. Timmons having been ill, it being but a short time ago that he passed through this city on his return from Astoria, and he seemed to be in his usual good health and spirits.

Bandon can ill-afford to lose such men as Mr. Timmons. He was a progressive citizen who was doing his part for the best welfare of that city and community. He had just completed a large building near the water front in that place of which he and the town were justly proud. He recently retired from the salmon canning business in which he was very successful, and expected to take life more quietly in the future.

Rebate Closed.

Today of last week closed the time in which taxpayers of Oregon were allowed a rebate on full payment of boxes. Up to the close of that day the collecting department of the Sheriff's office had taken in \$341,109.44, from which rebates to the amount of \$7,173.19, were allowed, leaving a net balance of 333,936.25. The full amount of Coos county taxes to be collected this year is, \$446,458.37. Last year the full amount of taxes assessed was \$211,489.93. A penalty of 12 per cent will be put on all unpaid taxes after next Monday, April 4th.
