## STATE ORGANIZER HILL TO DELIVER LECTURES.

State Organizer of the Farmer's Union, Charles A. Hill, of Pendleton, Oregon, arrived here Saturday and proceeded to give lectures over the county with a view to organize several unions. Mr. Hill is well informed along the lines of the Union and has his subject well in hand. He will talk at a number of school houses in country districts for the benefit of those who are unable to come into the towns on account of their work. He will deliver two lectures in Coquille Friday, the first at one and the second at 7:30 p. m. Every farmer in this section come out and hear him. Mr. Hill will be able to tell them more about their own interests in a few minutes than they will learn in months by reading, if they are looking up this matter at all.

The time has come when union goods are required in all markets. The individual shipper is so often swindled by commission men that they cannot longer afford to take the chances of shipping produce. With the producers fully organized and all products put up in a standard manner, and placed where graft is reduced to a minimum, much could be shipped and there would be some incentive to the farmers to produce more for the city markets.

Very enthusiastic meetings have been held at the Strang schoolhouse and in the Fishtrap section. At the latter place sixteen persons enrolled their names for membership in a Union to be organized in the future.

"Articles of incorporation were filed at Salem today, for the Coos Bay & Oregon Central Railroad Company, capital \$4,000,000. The purpose of the organization, as set forth in the articles, is to build a rail line between Coos Bay and Boise, Idaho. C. F. Hendrickson, Sam Connel and J. H. Cole, all of Portland, appear as the incorporators."

This new corporation has taken over the Haines survey which was made between Roseburg and Coos Bay during the past year, and while the incorporators have little to say, it is taken for granted that it means that road building will be begun in the not far distant future.

## Echos From Our Late School Meeting.

EDITOR HERALD:—The article in last week's issue of the Sentinel relating to our late school meeting unintentionally conveys a false impression of the facts as they actually exist. The article conveys the idea, by inference at least, that the minutes of a particular meeting were purposely left at the clerk's office, but this is not the fact.

The facts are, that there are two books of minutes and always have been. One contains the records of all public meetings of the voters of the district, and this book was at the meeting that night as it should have been. The other book contains the records of the private meetings of the school board, and this never has been taken to these public meetings. In fifty years I never knew or heard of the minutes of board meetings being taken either to special or annual meetings of the district, for they are no part of that work. However, had any one entitled to call for these minutes, informed the clerk or the board that they would like to have them brought to this public meeting, the clerk or the board would have taken them along with the other minutes. But the truth of the matter is, that neither the clerk nor the board had any intimation whatever that these minutes would be called for. And it is the only call in fifty years that I ever saw or heard of. And then the call was made by an outsider and not by a resident taxpayer.

In the second place, I was surprised to see the position of tacit support, taken by the Sentinel, in regard to the disgraceful scene enacted by one or two of the school children after the meeting adjourned. I would be surprised to see any man or woman who really believes in respect, courtesy, good manners and decency, support, even by inference, any such actions on the part of children toward older persons, and particularly so, when nothing whatever has been said to them. In all probability there is not a man or woman in our entire community, who is forty or fifty years of age, whose father or mother would have permitted such a thing in their day. Why! We were never allowed to "speak up" in a conversation going on between older persons, much less to "butt in," in a rude and insolent manner. I would not have dared to do such a thing. I would not have thought of it even. And if I had attempted such a thing, my old Virginia father would have settled me in a way I would have remembered to this day.

The scene was a disgrace to the children who took part in it, and a disgrace to the principal who permitted it, and I believe every honest, reasonable, fair minded man and woman will say so. I can just imagine such men as Prof. Sams, Prof. McKibben, Prof. Doggett, Prof. Smith, Prof. Clark, Prof. O. P. Kinsey, and many others I could mention allowing children of any high school under their charge, to do such a thing. And there are men living in this town who knew some of these gentlemen.

If Willie were to so forget himself as to break into a conversation that was none of his business, between older men such as Messrs Kern, Howey, Burns, Knowlton and Prof. Bunch, I would most certainly correct and punish him for doing so. I would do this for the sake of the boy, and to teach him good manners, to respect older persons, even though in my private opinion I believed the boy was correct in his ideas and the older person was mistaken. One of the greatest detriments to good government, to civic righteousness, as Ex-President Roosevelt put it, "One of the greatest curses to our nation today is, that children disobey their parents at home." This leads them to disobey their teachers at school, the laws of their town, their state and their country, and this leads them to the jail and the penitentiary, then some people stand back and wonder why, when every man and woman who possesses even the rudiments of common sense knows why, and it they have the moral courage of their convictions they can tell you. Thanks! In memory of my old gray haired father and mother I repeat it, thanks! That they taught me to respect age. Thanks! That they taught me to have the moral courage to stand for what I believed to be right, and to openly express myself for the right. And I will continue to stand for what I believe to be right, and will openly fight for what I conceive to be just, even though I stand alone and against every other man and woman in the community.
