San Francisco, May 5.—Death from accidental causes was the verdict returned today by the Coroner's Jury in the case of Tommy McCarthy, the prizefighter who was killed last Friday night in a fight with Owen Moran, the English lightweight champion.

### Circuit Court.

Judge Harris, having finished up his portion of the present term of Circuit Court, departed for his home at Eugene last Wednesday. There were something like 140 cases docketed for this term, and Judge Harris was called to hear about 20. Judge Coke having been interested in the cases as attorney. Judge Coke is now grinding away on the remainder which will possibly require another week's time for their disposal. Below we give the disposition of a number:
