NOTICE OF ESTABLISHMENT OF GRADE.

Spurgeon Street and Extension Thereof. Notice is hereby given that the Common Council has duly declared its intention to establish the grade of Spurgeon Street and the extension of Spurgeon Street in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, which intention is on file in the office of the City Recorder and is hereby referred to as a part of this notice.

Said proposed grade is as follows: Commencing at the east end of said Spurgeon Street and in the center thereof at an elevation of 39.0 feet above mean low tide as fixed by the United States bench mark in the north-west corner of Block 29 of Elliott's addition to Coquille City, Coos County, Oregon, for the subgrade of said Spurgeon Street; thence westerly along the center line of said street with a plus 6.875 feet to Station 1 at an elevation of 52.75 feet at Station 2 established by the City Engineer; thence westerly with a plus 4.375 feet per 100 feet to Station 2 plus 40 to an elevation of 54.5 feet; thence westerly with a minus 0.975 feet per 100 feet to Station 3 to an elevation of 53.916 feet; thence with a minus 2.64 feet to Station 4 to an elevation of 46.0 feet; thence with a minus 7.0 feet per 100 feet to Station 5 to an elevation of 45.0 feet; thence with a plus 0.333 feet per 100 feet to Station 10 to an elevation of 46.00 feet; thence with a minus 0.5 feet to Station 15 to an elevation of 44.5 feet. The true grade shall be one foot above subgrade as above given. The curb grade shall be at the same elevation as the center of the Street, and gutters on either side of the street and on street side of sidewalk shall be one foot below true grade.
