Canning in Coos.

There is a great deal being said, and we have good reason to think that there will be something doing in the not far distant future in this line to a greater extent than for home use as in the past. There is a move on foot among the Granges and Farmers' Union for the establishment of a large fruit and vegetable cannery in this valley which we would surely be pleased to see materialize soon. That the fruit and vegetables and fruits would be forth coming goes without saying, and it is a well-known fact that no nicer produce of this kind can be raised anywhere, regarding which we give the following from the Coos Bay Times:

The best thought of the progressive Cooscountyite is now turning to the unlimited field of endeavor hereabout in the small fruit and berry lines. There is nothing more promising here, and in a few years this industry should develop into an important one.

The hill lands and the logged-off lands everywhere are admirably adapted to this culture, and the yield is heavy and quick and the market handsomely responsive; every element of the business is favorable, and favoring, all over the country, and from the amount of talk abroad in this behalf it is evident that many men will push the opportunity and make the best of it, from this time on.

It is time something was being done to make this county distinctively good for something. Everything that has been done to date, along the line of agriculture, and horticulture, has been of a piece meal sort; there is nothing of note or peculiar promise anywhere save in the dairying line, which is going forward constantly to better and higher degrees of scope and character, and the new departure in small fruits will be welcomed for the certain success that will follow its intelligent development and the assured profits inseparable from it.

About eleven o'clock this morning the Union Fishrie Company's fishing fleet, consisting of the power boat Fish and the launch Skidoo, and ten husky fishermen sailed into the harbor and dropped anchor at the old anchorage grounds near the old salt house. Clyde Chase of the Union Fishrie Co. is here in person and says they are here for business. They have their own gear and will commence fishing at once. The fleet had a very rough trip down, Mr. Chase said, and the way the boys hustled wet blankets and clothing out to dry, confirms Mr. Chase's story. They left Big creek, this side of Coos Bay, about 10 o'clock last night and soon struck a fog bank to avoid any possible accident on the reef they kept well out to sea where they encountered rough water. The Fish had in tow a drift boat which broke loose several times and at last it got away and they were unable to pick it up. Captain Ellerby of the launch Skidoo had his wife and little girl aboard the launch during the night but were put aboard the Fish after daylight this morning. They experienced a very disagreeable night, being drenched to the skin and protected only by wet blankets. Mr. Chase says he has arranged with the Coast to call here twice a week and carry his fish to Marshfield on ice. He will handle his catch on board the Fish and not go to the expense of building a salt house.—Gold Beach Globe.
