Carl Walker Hurt.

Carl Walker, of this city, who has been running out of Roseburg for some months as a brakeman on the Southern Pacific, was hurt last Thursday afternoon, regarding which the Roseburg Evening Review says: Carl Walker, a Southern Pacific freight brakeman, was severely injured on the Y at Drain Thursday afternoon, while standing on the iron ladder of a boxcar. As the train passed through a bridge, a projecting girder knocked him to the ground, inflicting painful bruises over most of his body. No bones were broken. He is now in Mercy Hospital in this city.

Mrs. Carl Jenkins, his sister, went out Sunday and is now by his side to render any assistance she can.

A telephone message from one of the nurses would indicate that he was in no imminent danger, while it was a very close call for his life. He was rendered unconscious for a time, having received some severe bruises and cut on the head. We hope to hear of his speedy recovery.

What might have been a horrible accident happened at the Coquille Steam Laundry when Miss Ocie Lane got one hand and arm and the other hand into the mangle. The accident happened early while the girls were putting blankets on the rollers, and the steam had not been turned into the machine or her hands and arm would have been burned till amputation would have had to be resorted to, and as the full pressure was not on, the bones were not crushed as one would suppose they would have been, however, they are badly bruised. Miss Sanders who was assisting her shifted the belt as quickly as she could, but before the machine stopped one arm was drawn in almost to the elbow, and before she could be released the tension screws were loosened which was not sufficient to release her, and a wrench was procured and the roller taken off. This allowed her arm and hand to be removed without further injury. Dr. Richmond was called and soon had the arm and hand bandaged and treated, and the patient was soon resting as well as could be expected under the circumstances. Her many friends sincerely hope that the injuries may not be of a permanent nature.

Messrs. Keller & Willard, who have the contract for furnishing Arago gravel for the county road near Coquille, have supplied a quantity sufficient to complete the road above town, and on Saturday their big scows began to land here at the city's dock and the teamsters began hauling for the Cunningham road. The large barn of R. C. Dement at Myrtle Point burned to the ground on Monday evening. All stock, vehicles farm machinery, etc., were saved, but a large quantity of hay and the building were totally destroyed. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is thought that spontaneous combustion may have been responsible for the conflagration.

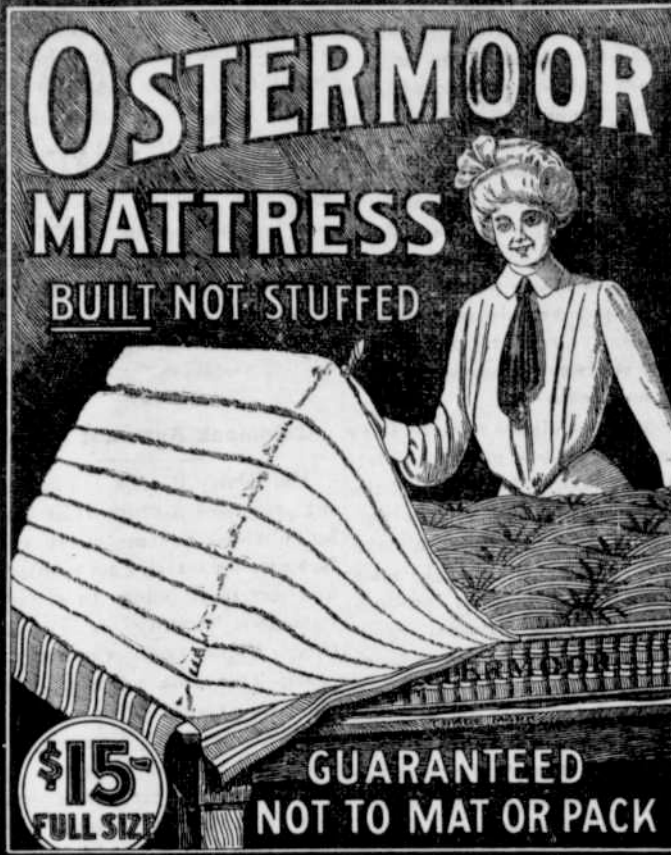
