R. J. Dear Hurt.

Robert J. Dean, the Norway dairyman, was seriously hurt by being thrown from a horse at about three o'clock Sunday afternoon. He and Louis Smith were returning from the lower part of the farm on horseback, and were riding very fast. A hundred yards or so from the barn there was a turn in the road, Mr. Smith was just a little ahead and did not notice just what happened, but as he reached the barn, noticed Mr. Dean's horse came galloping up without its rider. He waited a few moments to speak to two gentlemen who came riding up from the same direction, and who had not noticed the hurt man by the roadside. The three returned to the turn in the road, at which a telephone post stood, by which Mr. Dean lay, evidently having struck the pole, and with such force that his skull is fractured. Dr. Stemler, of Myrtle Point was called, and Monday passed through with his patient for the Bay Mr. Dean had not yet gained consciousness when they passed through, and it was thought he would not until the pressure on the brain was relieved by an operation.

We learned yesterday that the operation had been performed, and that consciousness had not returned. He was accompanied to the Bay by his brother-in-law, Ed Detlefson.
