Alex Adams Injured

On Monday at 10 a. m., Alex Adams, of Myrtle Point, was seriously if not fatally hurt at Cody's Camp. He was falling at the time, and the tree that he and his partner had cut, kicked back over the stump, striking a small tree, knocking it down. As it fell it struck Mr. Adams injuring his head and crushing one leg. He had not gained consciousness at last reports and recovery seems to be impossible.

Died.—At the family home at Prosper, Oregon, November 29, 1910, Mrs. J. W. Field, aged thirty-five years, of tuberculosis. The interment took place the day following at the Bear Creek cemetery. The deceased was born in California, but had spent many years of her life in Oregon, having lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Butts, on Bear Creek, and since their passing over and her marriage to Mr. Field they have lived at Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon where she made many warm friends who regret her untimely end. She is survived by her husband and two little daughters, Esther and Inez, six and two years old respectively.
