Gorham, a pioneer settler of Coos county, died suddenly at his home near Parkersburg Monday, shortly after returning from a walk. He was 89 years of age. Mr. Gorham crossed the plains in 1865, coming to this county in 1866, at which time there was one log cabin in Coquille. He died Dec. 28, 1909.
