**Can't Kill Pheasants.**  
Salem, Or., Feb. 17.—Chinese pheasants are to be protected for two years under house bill 372 passed by the senate this morning. A vote of 21 to 8 in its favor was preceded by a lively debate, continuing the fight of yesterday, Bean of Lane, trying to extend protection to all upland birds. Under the present law killing of female birds is prohibited and the new law extends the law to all pheasants for two years. Miller of Linn, in support of the bill declared that the farmer has not been considered sufficiently in game legislation.

He asserted the law as it stands is a failure, for sportsmen do kill the hens. He said the sportsmen have had their way for years and the time has come to give real protection for the birds, which are rapidly being destroyed. He said \$50,000 has been piled up in the game fund, and still the pheasant is disappearing.
