LAND GRANT CASE IS STILL HANGING FIRE

Is President Taft wrong in insisting that there be more expedition in the processes of the courts?

It was two years ago Wednesday that the land grant case against the Southern Pacific with the United States as plaintiff was argued before Judge Wolverton. It was in September, 1908, that the complaint was filed. It was early in 1908, that congress passed the resolution directing the attorney general to bring proceedings for forfeiture of the lands. There is no decision yet.

After the case was argued, the parties were given 60 days each in which to file briefs, but the Southern Pacific's brief was not filed until September 1, 1909. The government's brief was completed on November 15, following, but Mr. Townsend took it to Washington for a conference with attorney General Wickersham.

It so happened that the Ballinger affair was acute at that time, and it was June 2, 1910, when the printed brief was finally filed with Judge Wolverton. It is a huge document of more than 800 pages and the digestion of it a ponderous undertaking for the court.

After it, came a reply brief by the railroad, which, with briefs filed by the intervening squatters and the vacation of Judge Wolverton consumed the time until October 15, last. Grand jury cases followed until January 16, 1911, and it was only from that date until February 3, that Judge Wolverton had time for consideration of the briefs. On the latter date, he was sent to San Francisco to sit in the court of appeals, where he still remains.

Winters have come and summers gone. The case begun more than two and a half years ago is still undecided in the initial court. There are rumors that a determination of the issue will be reached during the current month. Without reflecting in the slightest on any court or official thereof, and granting that there have been unusual reasons for delay, it is pertinent to inquire how long it will take this case to pass through the court of appeals and then meet a final adjudication in the United States supreme court. Is Mr. Taft not right in contending that there ought to be more expedition in the trial of cases.—Journal.

COUNCIL DESIRES TO HAVE CHARTER AMENDED

At a special meeting of the council Tuesday night it was decided to submit a proposed amendment to the charter to the voters at the coming election May 8, amending that portion relating to publishing of notices for street improvements. The old ordinance provides that the notice shall be published in two issues of a weekly newspaper, and at the expiration of that time property holders have 20 days to file a remonstrance. The proposed amendment shortens the publication to one issue and the 20 days begins with the date of publication. This will shorten the time between the notice for street improvements and the passing of the ordinance ordering the improvements about two weeks.

It is also proposed to amend the charter so the council may, when they deem it expedient, have work on street improvements done by day labor instead of by contract.
