KINNEY IS FORCED INTO BANKRUPTCY

The taking of evidence in the natter of L. D. Kinney and the Belt Line Railway Company alleged bankrupts was begun Saturday before C. F. McKnight, special referee, and lasted all day and continued until Monday with Kinney still on the stand.

The ruling was made by the referee that before evidence could be introduced by either side that a deposit of \$100 must be made to defray expenses of holding the hearing. The representative of the creditors put up the amount, but Kinney said that he nor the Belt Line company were unable to pay cent, as they were broke.

Under oath Kinney acknowledged an indebtedness of \$278,000 but the attorneys for the creditors have claims filed against him amounting to \$350,000 in round numbers.
