\$7,000,000 Business.

The volume of business in and out over the Coos Bay bar has had a remarkable growth in the last ten years according to statistics compiled by the Port Commission and Chamber of Commerce to present

to Congress showing that the commercial importance here warrants a larger appropriation for harbor bar improvement. According to these figures, the value of the shipments from Coos Bay last year was \$3,677,400 while the value of the goods shipped into Coos Bay last year was \$3,052,550. These figures reveal that there were 8,160 passengers arriving on Coos Bay during the year just closed and 7,935 departing. An estimate of the freight and passenger earnings for the port place the total for lumber at \$540,000, on coal, 39,000; on all other freight, 160,000, and on passengers, \$869,850.—Times.

KINNEY IS FORCED INTO BANKRUPTCY

The taking of evidence in the matter of L. D. Kinney and the Belt Line Railway Company alleged bankrupts was begun Saturday before C. F. McKnight, special referee, and lasted all day and continued until Monday with Kinney still on the stand.

The ruling was made by the referee that before evidence could be introduced by either side that a deposit of \$100 must be made to defray expenses of holding the hearing. The representative of the creditors put up the amount, but Kinney said that he nor the Belt Line company were unable to pay a cent, as they were broke.

Under oath Kinney acknowledged an indebtedness of \$278,000 but the attorneys for the creditors have claims filed against him amounting to \$350,000 in round numbers.

By agreement the attorneys asked the court for an adjournment until the 20th of this month at which time further taking of testimony will be taken up. These cases were set down for hearing in Portland on the 14th where Referee McKnight must go and take the testimony of all concerned in Portland.

The creditors are being represented by Fred Hollister and N. C. McLeod of North Bend, Judge Hammond of Coquille, and Chas. I. Reigard of Marshfield. Mr. Hollister has spent a great deal of time for the benefit of his clients and is feeling jubilant in having succeeded as well as he has. He says that he intends to see that the title to all these properties that Kinney has had under control is straightened out, once and for ever.

Mr. Kinney and the Belt Line Company are represented by Simon Beach and Nelson of Portland, but locally by Farrin & Farrin of Marshfield.

The petitioning creditors are John G. Horn, Geo. Witte and J. T. McGuire of North Bend and are represented by Chas. B. Selby of Marshfield.

Those who heard Mr. Kinney testify state that he seems anxious to have his property sold for the benefit of his creditors, but say that the claim of F. D. Waite is not a just one, being profited and that he had paid Waite all he had ever owed him. He admits that he is down and out, that is, he is broke and that he wants his property to inure to the benefit of his just creditors. He also testified under oath that he was framing up a deal with the Hill interests for his Coos Bay property and if given an opportunity without interference would close the deal April 25th. This he said would mean a great deal to Coos Bay. However the continuation of the trial will, we presume, queer the deal.—Harbor.

Lafollette Scores Ballinger.

Madison, Wis., March 11.—Demanding that an investigation of the administration of Richard A. Ballinger as secretary of the interior be prosecuted immediately and vigorously, Lafollette's Weekly, in an editorial declares that Ballinger retired when confronted with the possibility of impeachment proceedings at the approaching extra session of congress. The editorial says: The resignation is the last desperate attempt of the administration to close the pages of history on the official action of Ballinger. The appointment of Walter L. Fisher was prompted by a desire to win back the confidence of the people in the administration. But no resignation and no presidential assurance will remove the public necessity for a searching investigation.
