Question—Do you think men are naturally religious, or as much so as women?

Since nature, he believed that higher personages were angry at him and he tried in many ways to appease this imaginary wrath. There followed the worship of these imaginary and higher powers, which has developed through all the ages until our present form of worship. It has been handed down so long as to be thoroughly imbedded in the minds of men that worship is necessary to appease the duty of the present day. So I think I should say that in naturally worshipful, which perhaps this way the majority of men are is what you would call religious.

Another says, Yes, I believe every sane man of 30 years of age has some time in his life either prayed for help from a greater power than himself or hidden his thoughts in terror from such a power.

Question—Is the Christian life a practicable one?

One writes, As I see the question it is not practicable, and not at all desirable. Christ was a dreamer and an idler.
