Are those moving for the recall of Judge Coke in the Second district sure they have a just cause? The recall does not contemplate that a judge shall be recalled for his mere point on a legal question. There are two sides to every case in court, or there would be no case. It is impossible for a judge to be on both sides, and yet, if he is to be recalled for his view on a legal question, he must be on both sides or always be liable to be recalled.

Judge Coke is to be subjected to the recall because of his instruction to the jury in the McChallen case. Who is to say that his instructions were wrong—the electorate? How can the electorate decide whether his instructions on technical legal points were right or wrong?

The lawyers on one side will say he was right, and the lawyers on the other side will insist that he was wrong.

In the middle, a muddle in which the lawyers themselves are divided, how can any layman or the laymen acting together decide the question correctly?

A judge is not anointed from on high. He is not exalted above earthly things. In the Dread Scott case, the highest tribunal in the land uttered a decision that is execrated by history. The same high court once held an income tax constitutional and then unconstitutional. But, in the very nature of things, it is as the confusion of tongues at the Tower of Babel for an electorate of hymens to attempt determination of whether a judge is right or wrong on a legal question.

If a judge goes on the bench in a stage of intoxication; if a judge permits a railroad attorney to finance his campaign as did a supreme justice in Washington; if a judge become a known corruptionist, a political trickster or dissolute in his habits, then he is within the scope of what prudent men accept as possible reason for invoking the recall.

It is a weapon to be rarely used. Its virtue lies more in its presence as a deterrent than in its actual employment. It is better never used than used unwisely.—Oregon Journal.

Jack Marsden, a saloon keeper from North Bend is lodged in the city jail charged with assault with intent to kill Attorneys J. W. and Tom Bennett in the Flanagan & Bennett Bank building shortly after two o'clock this afternoon.

According to the story of the affair in the hands of the police, Marsden, J. W. Bennett and Tom Bennett all went up to the office together to talk over the results of a recent law suit brought by Marsden against his father in which the Bennetts figured as attorneys for Robert Marsden, senior.

They first went into the office occupied by J. W. Bennett in the building, but, fearing trouble with Marsden, who had previously threatened the Elder Bennett's life, they retired to an inner office occupied by Tom Bennett. At J. W. Bennett's request, Tom Bennett remained in the room.

During the discussion of the case that ensued, Marsden became more and more abusive and reached a climax by drawing a revolver from his pocket while addressing the words, "I'll get you now," to J. W. Bennett.

Marsden had no sooner drawn the gun than he was pounced upon and thrown to the floor of the office by Tom Bennett who, with the assistance of his father, succeeded in holding the would-be murderer while the stenographer in the office reached the window opening over the crowded street below and screamed for help.

Marshal Jack Carter, who was attracted by the girl's cries, hurried to the office, followed by a large crowd, and placed Marsden under arrest.

The feeling which led up to the near tragedy today is of long standing. Some time ago Marsden brought suit against his father to recover \$750. The Bennetts appeared at the trial as attorneys for the older man. The jury in the case refused to recognize young Marsden's claim and, besides deciding the case against him, ordered him to pay his father the sum of \$200.

Marsden has several times said that he was going to kill J. W. Bennett for his connection in the case, but the Bennetts always looked upon the threat as an empty one.—Coos Bay Times.

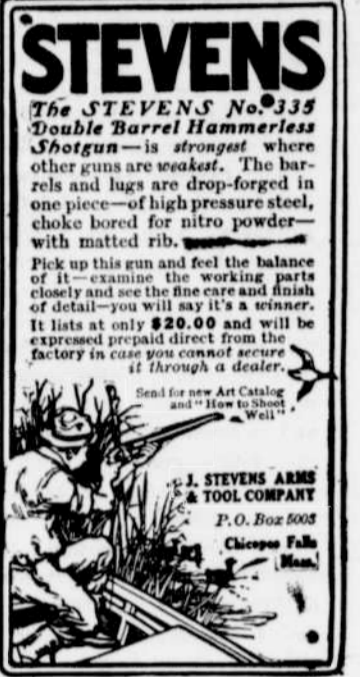
