Fires were placed under the boilers in the new mill now being completed at the west line of the Coquille City limits, and steam pressure sufficient to run a pump and blow the whistle was raised. By the last of the week a trial will be made of the machinery, and a little sawing for lumber and timbers about the mill will be done in the next two weeks.

Judge John S. Coke came over from Marshfield Monday and heard the argument in the case of the State against R. G. Case which is expected to prove an important one owing to the fact that it is to determine the constitutionality of which is known as the "Peddlers' Law," and which was passed at the 1909 session of the Oregon Legislature. Laws of a like nature in other states have been held unconstitutional as it discriminates as to who may sell goods in this state which are manufactured in another state. The Judge took the matter under advisement as there is a great deal of constitution and law to be looked up before he will give a decision.

Resolutions drawn by J. W. Bennett, E. Mings and J. V. Smeaton, according to wishes expressed at a recent mass meeting of business men of the city and ratified by the Chamber of Commerce, have been forwarded to the state representatives in Congress. The resolutions set forth the fact, that it is of vital importance that the depressed portions of the north jetty, at the entrance of the bay, be raised to the level of high tide and that the jetty be further extended 1000 feet. The construction of a south jetty to extend 2,500 feet out from Coos Head is also advocated.

Messrs. Kime & Von Pegert, the blacksmiths and machinists, are about through with the moving of their plant to the new building which stands directly east of the Pointer livery barn. This shop is one of the biggest in the county, being, we believe, the same in size as that of Charles Adams of Myrtle Point, i. e. fifty by one hundred feet. The building stands on a very solid foundation of piling, and the frame is as strong and substantial as there is any need for, and the roof and siding are of corrugated iron, which greatly reduces the dangers from fire. Their equipment will be first class when fully installed and they will be prepared to do any work in their line in a skilled and workman-like manner. W. W. Endicott, the horseshoer, has a forge and corner leased and will look after his branch of the work in a manner well known to a large number of the horse owners of the valley.

101 Years Old

Grandma Todd of Eugene, this county, is in attendance at the convention of the Christian church at Portland. She has lived in this county for 20 years and this is her first visit to Portland at the ripe old age of 101 years. She boarded the train almost unassisted and is as hearty as many a woman of half her age. She walks alone and, although she carries a cane, does not depend upon it for support. He had everything curves, speed and control and the opposing stickers were completely at his mercy. Striking out 16 men allowing but 5 scattered hits is some pitching.

The Coquille infield showed marked improvements and pulled off some fast snappy plays.

While the visitors startled the spectators with two double plays and the fine work of McNair and Holman in the outfield were features.

The Bandon team impressed the fans by the clean article of ball they put up and the sportsman-like manner in which they took their defeat. The same teams meet next Sunday at Bandon.
