Announcement of the candidacy of J. S. Barton for State Representative from this district appears in this issue. Mr. Barton is a thorough business man, full of vim and vigor, a loyal Republican and a strict adherent to matters of justice.

George E. Peoples has a card elsewhere in the Herald announcing himself as a candidate for assessor on the Republican ticket. Taking his conduct in business affairs as a criterion the assumption would naturally tend to the opinion that he will be a winner.

Judge E. G. D. Holden has filed his declaration as a candidate for Justice of the Peace upon the Republican ticket. No one has as yet signified a desire to dispossess our most worthy and venerable Judge from the position he has long and efficiently held, and the reasons therefor are obvious.

C. S. Jackson of Roseburg comes out boldly this week in announcing his candidacy for Prosecuting Attorney for the Third district, and he promises to be equally as brave, if elected, in the enforcement of the criminal laws. Men of this character in the official capacity he seeks are requisite to the peace and dignity of our country, and to stand like "Old Stonewall," a formidable antagonist in battling for the right.

I. S. Smith, of Marshfield, is a candidate for the Republican nomination for the office of State Senator for this district. Mr. Smith is not a novice in political matters having been a delegate to the National convention that nominated Roosevelt for president in 1904, and has also represented the people of Coos county in the state legislature. He is a native born Oregonian, fully understands the needs of his constituents and has the ability and manhood to serve them with credit to himself and honor to the commonwealth. His card elsewhere gives the platform upon which he stands.

Frank S. Fields, county clerk of Multnomah county since 1892, is out for the nomination for Secretary of State on the Republican ticket. During the last eight years of his administration as county clerk Mr. Fields has enriched the coffers of Multnomah county \$37,810, while the former administration, for a like period of time, occasioned a deficit of \$50,895. If nominated and elected (as he will be) his efforts will be put forward to produce like results in the office of the Secretary of State. Mr. Fields is a Republican of the right sort—working for the interest of his own party by serving the people in an official capacity conscientiously and honestly, the appreciation of which will be amply demonstrated when the election returns are announced, both at the primaries and in November next.

The Coos Bay Times of Saturday last consisting of fifty-two pages is before us, and we are amazed at the production of so creditable a paper emanating from a town the size of Marshfield. It is printed on good quality of book paper, the front page containing a map depicting the routes of the several railroads proposed together with steamship lines leading to important places on the continent. Statistics interesting to our residents, as well as valuable to those contemplating a home in our favored section, are given upon all subjects in an attractive manner. It is the best edition of a newspaper we have been privileged to scan for many a day, and if the citizens of Marshfield view the true worth of the paper one-half as much as we do, they have cause to be proud of the owners and workers who made possible the execution of so valuable a work.

BIDS AWARDED FOR STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Regular session of the city council Monday evening, March 18. All members and officers present.

The Coos Bay Paving and Construction company were awarded the contract for paving First street, bond of \$1,000 for the proper performance of the work to be given.

W. J. Longston presented a bid of \$1,738.60 for the construction of a sewer on First and C streets, which being the lowest submitted was awarded the work. He furnishes a bond of \$1,000.

Plans and specifications were ordered prepared by the city engineer for sewer on Second street in Elliott's addition.

Resolutions were passed recommending changes of grades of a portion of Hall and Second streets in Elliott's addition.

The street committee were ordered to have piles driven to hold the lower wharf intact.

Mayor Quick reported that he had reviewed the proposed sewer district and his recommendations were in accord with those of the city engineer. Report accepted.

The council instructed the city recorder to have the interior of the city hall painted and papered, and to secure a suitable desk as an archive for city documents.

Bill of J. A. Lamb, \$202.55, for 1,500 feet 7 inches of 2-inch galvanized water pipe was ordered paid. Meeting adjourned.

Do Not Meddle with the Hose Wagon

Coquille firemen have had notices printed embodying Ordinance No. 38 relative to the protection of fire apparatus of the city. The ordinance provides a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail not to exceed fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment for any person who shall be found guilty of interfering or meddling with any fire apparatus. The ordinance was adopted and approved June 5, 1907, and bears the signature of J. J. Stanley as mayor and R. R. Pownder as city recorder.


