PATRIOTISM—OUR MOTIVE

Good roads' day Saturday, May 11.

Material for the socialist paper arrived here Tuesday, but the press being broken in transit publication is delayed.

Roseburg's fourth annual strawberry festival will take place May 16, 17 and 18. Indications are that abundance of the luscious fruit will be on exhibition and many interesting features are promised to gratify visitors.

The beautiful custom of observing Mothers' Day, which was started but a few years ago by a young lady residing in an eastern state, has spread all over the country, and Sunday, May 12, countless thousands will wear a white flower in memory of mother, should she have passed to the spirit world, or a colored flower in her honor should they still be blessed with her living presence.

Changes of a most sweeping character in the administration of the penitentiary affairs were announced from Governor West's office May 1, when Superintendent C. W. James, one parole officer, a matron and a chaplain were suspended until January 1 next, and the head farmer dismissed. The changes, it is stated, were made for the purpose of retrenchment and on the grounds of economy, and were necessary at this time, particularly in order to prevent a deficiency in the penitentiary appropriation. The total amount which it is expected will be saved to the state between now and the first of next year approximates \$3,000.

'Do you want your state to be behind China?' This is a question Oregon women are asking of Oregon men just now. Plainly the Chinese parliament intends to cure all the evils of democracy in advance by having the completest possible equality and enfranchising the women on the same basis as the men. Equal suffrage for women in China is an established fact. It is limited as yet, but evidently the people are going to rule—not merely the male half. 'When in history has there been such a revolution as has come over the Celestial Empire, at least in so short a time and with such a complete overturning of the old forms of government? Women voting in China before the franchise is granted in the United States or England. Anyone who would have prophesied this two years ago would have been thought insane. As things now stand, the Anglo-Saxons who have always been so proud of their chivalry toward women must look out lest they should be the last to grant to women their right to partake in all the privileges and responsibilities of government.'—New York Post.

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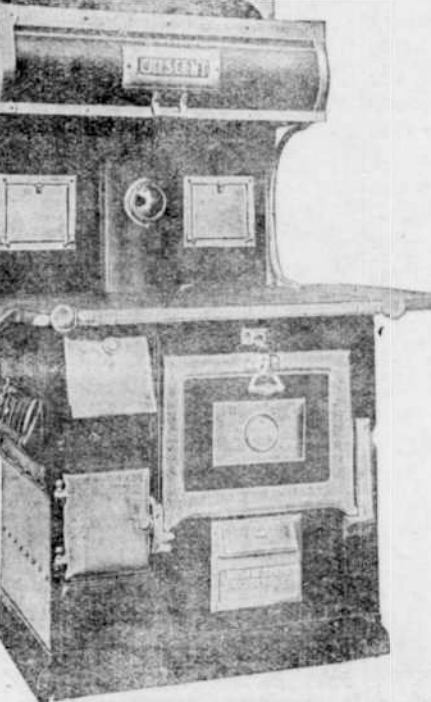

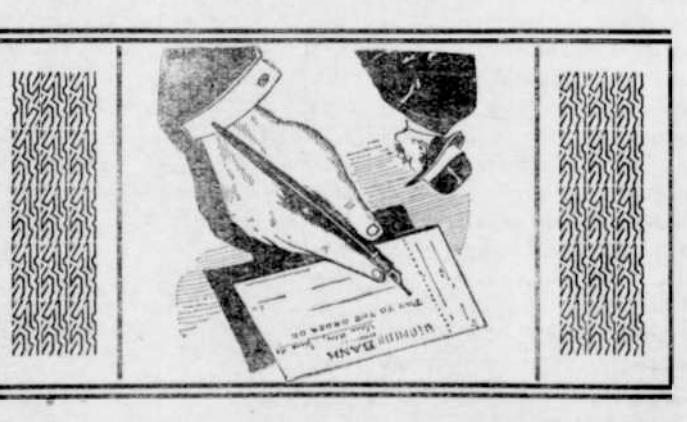
