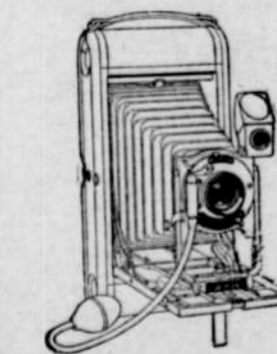

Oliver Hoglie returned from Portland Tuesday to abide with us permanently. We understand Mr. Hoglie was a passenger on the Carpathia, returning from a trip to his home in Sweden, at the time of the rescue by that vessel of the Titanic survivors, and he states that he never again wishes to witness a scene of such unparalleled distress.

Arrangements are perfected for the annual camp-meeting of the Seventh Day Adventists, and the meetings will begin today May 9. By-laws were adopted for the government of the league and a schedule of ten games agreed upon, thus giving each club an opportunity of playing the other five teams twice during the season. Conditions being favorable the first games will be played on May 26 at the following places: Bandon at Marshfield; Coquille at Eastside; Myrtle Point at North Bend.

COQUILLE RIVER BOILS AND PRODUCES STEAM

An unusual spectacle presented itself at seven o'clock this morning near the ferry, and onlookers entertained varied opinions regarding the cause of the phenomena. Near the center of the Coquille river water was boiling up accompanied by steam of sufficient quantity to be observed a block away. Had an oil gusher broke loose? No, there was no oil upon the surface. Was it gas? It produced no odor. What could it be? Thus inquiries were made by witnesses of the scene. Investigation by the Herald man produced the facts. About three months ago when Mr. Nosler, of Nosler & Norton, was transferring freight from the Tillamook to the steamer Myrtle, two fifty pound drums of carbide fell overboard. Water is all that is required to produce activity of carbide and one of the lost drums by being jostled about by the current was broken sufficient to give vent with the result above noted. At the time the carbide was lost the river was sweetened by a one hundred pound sack of sugar, but no unusual results are looked for from that source.
