ROOSEVELT WINS OHIO BY 30,000

Reports just received are to the effect that Roosevelt carried Ohio securing thirty-two out of forty-four delegates, and much elation is expressed by the Colonel as it apparently assures him of the nomination. President Taft is not perturbed at the result. Primaries will be held in New Jersey next Tuesday.

The knowledge that 14,000 tons of railroad material is to be shipped to Coos Bay immediately, or at least as fast as vessels can be secured for transporting it, is news that is encouraging. F. C. Hitchcock said before he left that this amount of material would be shipped here and perhaps more. This tonnage is to come by way of San Francisco.—Record.

CITY COUNCIL PAYS ON STREET IMPROVEMENTS

A regular meeting of the city council was held Monday evening, May 20. Mayor Quick in the chair. City Attorney Liljeqvist, Recorder Lawrence and Marshal Evernden present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The city engineer was ordered to prepare a profile and data of a proposed alteration of the First street grade. Moved by Mansell and seconded by Laird that the recorder notify Mr. Longston to finish his contract as soon as possible.

The city engineer recommended that contractors on both sewer and paving be paid \$600 each on their contracts. Warrants were ordered drawn as recommended.

Moved that the city recorder be allowed \$75 per month salary, \$50 to be paid out of the general fund and \$25 out of the water fund.

Moved that deed to the J. A. Collier property be accepted, recorded and warrants be drawn in payment of the same in compliance with the ordinance relative thereto. Council adjourned.

OLD PRINTER-SOLDIER RESIDENT OF COQUILLE

Charles W. Case is among the recent arrivals choosing Coquille for a home. Mr. Case favored the Herald with a pleasant call the other day and informed us that he began work as a printer's devil in 1848 on a paper known as the "Banner of Liberty" in the state of New York; that he graduated from the satanic appellation and had worked the greater portion of his life at the business.

Mr. Case has a certificate given him by the Printers' Union of Peoria, Illinois, bearing date of 1858. His first presidential vote was cast for Fremont. He expressed a belief that the next president would be a democrat.

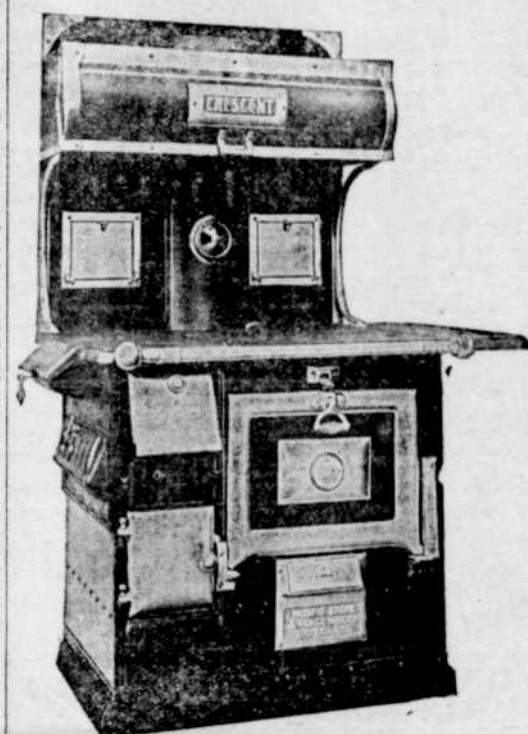
