EXPERIMENT STATION DAY

IMPORTANT TO OUR FARMERS

Practical Experts to Address Producers From the Soil Upon Topics of Interest to All Progressive Citizens

On Wednesday next, June 19, Hon. A. H. Carson, commissioner of the third horticultural district of Grants Pass; Prof. Reimer, director of the McHord experiment station, and Professors Jackson and Wilson of the Corvallis station, will address the people of Coquille upon agricultural and horticultural subjects. Other prominent speakers may also be present.

It is hoped the outcome of this meeting will be the establishment of an experiment station for the counties of Coos, Curry and the western portion of Douglas. Petitions are now in circulation with this object in view and all having the welfare of this section at heart should sign it.

W. L. Kistner, president of the Farmers' Union has called a meeting for 1:00 o'clock today at the W. O. W. hall, this city, at which time arrangements will be made for the entertainment of the distinguished guests. It is said a basket picnic on the court house lawn is one of the features proposed. The guests will be shown the country hereabouts by automobiles, and we doubt not our farmer friends will give the visitors a good time.

It is said that Mr. Russ, who owns considerable land near the river opposite Coquille, will donate sufficient land for the site of the proposed station, but we are not authoritatively informed on that point.

Several hundred letters have been sent out by a committee from the Farmers' Union the following being a copy:

Coquille, Oregon, June 12.
W. C. Chase, dear sir: We are addressing you as a representative citizen of your community to enlist your support and assistance in the measure proposed relative to a branch experiment station. You will of course recognize that this is a matter of vital importance to us all. The proposed station is intended to serve both Curry and Coos counties. It is probable that there will be similar propositions presented by other sections of the state at the coming session of the legislature. It is therefore very important that all our people take a lively interest in our own project in order that the authorities that have the giving of the needed appropriations may be convinced that we are entitled to that which we ask for. We ask that you urge upon all your neighbors that they attend the meeting to be held on June 19th at Coquille. We are of course anxious that the proposed station shall be located at the geographical and numerical center of the proposed district to be served, and special arrangements have been made to make the 19th of June "Experiment Day" at Coquille. The larger the attendance and interest shown in the project the better the impression made upon the visiting officers.


