HORTICULTURISTS VISIT COOS COUNTY

On Saturday last several hundred people assembled at Bridge to honor the arrival of and listen to addresses by Hon. A. H. Carson, commissioner of the third district of Grants Pass; Prof. Reimer, director of the Medford experiment station and Professors Jackson and Wilson of the Corvallis station. On Monday the distinguished visitors were at Myrtle Point, guests of the horticultural society, where they addressed the citizens of that thriving community who accorded a hearty welcome to the specialists.

At 5:30 o'clock Monday afternoon automobiles left Coquille for Myrtle Point to convey and escort the learned horticulturists to the county seat. The following chauffeurs, owners of their own cars, filled with progressive citizens, made the trip: Henry Lorenz, L. H. Hazard, R. H. Mast, Geo. Moulton, A. J. Sherwood's daughter Clare, J. C. Walling, J. S. Lyons, Wm. Lyons, J. A. Collier, Dr. Walter Culin, Paul Sterling, T. A. Walker, J. L. Thompson. Returning to the city at 7:00 o'clock, the first evidence of hospitality was given by the Coquille Band who played several popular pieces in their usual excellent manner. Dinner at the Baxter followed and social converse at the club rooms.

The party visited Bandon Tuesday going by steamer, returning same evening and were entertained at the Ko Keel Klub rooms.

Wednesday morning the visitors were given an auto ride to Fairview and in the afternoon they were taken to Arago by like conveyance, the Herald man accompanying to the latter place through the kindness of Frank Burkholder. Hon. A. H. Carson, while on the way, stated that the J. D. Benham orchard at Fairview was equal to any he had ever seen.

At Arago the cheese factory was given a call, and hundreds of circular formed products from the cow gave evidence of much activity in cheese making. P. H. Brewer, the storekeeper, when asked what he thought of the crowd said, "Looks like Arago had a boom." After a brief chat the party returned to Coquille speaking in glowing terms of the wonderfully productive country through which they journeyed.

Wednesday evening, addresses were delivered at Masonic hall by each of the professors. Hon. A. H. Carson who, for fifteen years, has been commissioner of the third district Oregon State Board of Horticulture at Grants Pass, spoke on lines intensely interesting not only to fruit growers but all who love to learn more of the wondrous works of nature in supplying man with the luxuries and necessities of life.

Prof. Reimer of the Medford experiment station gave his opinion that the Gravenstein apple and the Logan berry were the fruits that would make Coos county famous when raised in quantities sufficient to make it desirable to handle commercially.

Prof. Jackson's subject treated of fungus diseases and gave causes and cures, while Prof. Wilson dealt with insects, giving means for their extermination. The addresses were scientific and educational in character and will prove profitable if followed.

Prof. Carson stated a demonstration farm and not an experiment station is what Coos county should strive to secure through the medium of her representatives in the legislature.

The party left on the morning train Thursday for Marshfield where they will remain for a short time departing therefrom for their homes the last of the week.

Highest praise was expressed for hospitality extended them in the several places visited in Coos county and the harmony and united effort manifested by all Coquille in ministering to their enjoyment. Our citizens are certainly pleased with their visit and the results their teaching will ultimately produce for the betterment of our horticultural conditions.

Nine corking bingles combined with one double play and some remarkably clever pitching by James Collier gave the leading champions a 5 to 3 victory over Bandon last Sunday afternoon.

Seven of the nine swats figured in runs, one of which was James Collier's three bagger to center field, the longest hit made on the local grounds this season. The Colts fielded fine and were certainly at home with the willow, the presence of Byles behind the bat accounted in a great measure for the brilliant field work, this big back stop retired every man who attempted to steal, and his defensive strength was apparent in the work of the infield.

All the showing the Bandonians made in the seventh eighth and ninth was the noise of the bleachers, and one fan in the grandstand and he was sure a leader in that department of the national game.

In the eighth Coquille rallied and carried the ball sweating it five times for hits, Lorenz, Byles, J. Collier, Howell, Oerding, each advanced a man and in the final wind up the score stood 5-3 in Coquille's favor.

Notice to Contractors

Notice is hereby given that the Norway Drainage District will receive sealed bids for the construction of a drainage system in said district, in Coos county, Oregon, which will include the following:

Beginning at Station No. 0 in the bottom of a small stream; which said station is situated 625 feet north and 1380 feet west of the center of Section 30 in Township 28 south of Range No. 12 west of the W. M. Oregon.

From this station a ditch 6 feet on the bottom and having side slopes of 45°, is to be cut in a southeasterly direction to the quarter section line running north and south through the center of Section 30.

Station No. 0 is situated 1.99 ft above low tide as has previously been determined by the county surveyor, and the said ditch is to be excavated to this level for its entire length.

The approximate number of cubic yards of earth to be moved is 4220.2. All work subject to the inspection and approval of the County Surveyor, who will stake out the exact location of the proposed ditch, giving all necessary cuts, fills, excavations, etc.

The profile which is in the office of the County Surveyor shows the cuts, etc., from Station No. 0 to Station No. 3 plus 36 and is considered a part of these specifications. The balance of the ditch for a distance of approximately 1114 feet runs through the marsh and varies from a cut of 5 1/2 feet at Station No. 3 plus 36 to 3 feet at Station No. 14 plus 50.

The right of way of all ditches to be cleared four times the width of the ditch.

The width of the ditches is taken at the bottom and are to be excavated to within two feet of the level of extreme low tide, and have side slopes of 45°.

All ditches to be dug along the lines and at the places indicated by the plans, maps and survey of said drainage system now on file in the office of the County Clerk of Coos county, Oregon. All dirt removed from the ditches shall be placed not less than four feet from the edge of the ditch.

Any and all successful bidders will be required to enter into a written contract, and give bond with good and sufficient sureties for the faithful performance of their contracts. All bids to be forwarded in sealed envelopes to J. H. Barklow, secretary of the Norway Drainage District, Norway, by the 20th day of July, 1912.
