Coquille brought home another easy victory from the Bay, defeating Marshfield to the tune of 11 to 3. The colts had them outclassed in every department of the game—not once were they given a chance to win. Coquille collected 13 bingles off Sutton while Marshfield made 7 off Collier. One stolen base off Byles was Slim's record for the game.

Johnson started the fireworks by fanning the ozone, Lorenz was out on a grounder, Byles on an infield fly.

Marshfield started in like a winner, as Cowan was passed to first on "Dud's" fumble; Woods laid down a pretty sacrifice; Cowan stole third but was mugged trying for home and landers failed to touch the pill.

Marshfield presented Coquille with three runs in the second inning when J. Collier sailed one out of the lot; Howell took the initial bag on a fielder's choice; J. Collier scored on Briggs' error; Oerding and C. Collier were retired on pop flies; C. Collier slammed a double scoring J. Collier and Howell; Prey mugged first on Burke's error, stole, and A. Collier started home; Johnson was retired at first.

In the fourth Oerding attempted to stretch a single—was nailed on second; C. Collier patted the pill for a sack; A. Collier died on a fly to Woods; C. Collier reached second on Woods' wild throw; Prey singled, advanced "Kling" to third; Johnson tapped the nut scoring C. Collier and Prey; Lorenz was ousted at first.
