PATRIOTISM—OUR MOTIVE

Notwithstanding a protest "a sweet smile haunts him still."

The Socialist administration of Schenectady, New York, in an endeavor to sell ice to the poor of that city for 25 cents, being 15 cents less than dealers' price, was prevented from so doing by injunction proceedings. No law was cited as being violated only that the administration had no right to sell in competition to established dealers. CITY FATHERS TRANSACT IMPORTANT BUSINESS

Regular meeting of the city council held Monday, July 15.

Mayor Morrison in the chair. All councilmen and officers present except Laird.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Several petitions from property owners relative to altering and re-establishing grades on Spurgeon street were received and placed on file.

Specifications for the improvement of Spurgeon street and extension of the same, were presented by P. M. Hall-Lewis, city engineer. The estimate of the total cost of the foregoing work, as indicated by the plans, is \$4,467, or \$1.87 per front foot, on a total of 2,390 front feet as a basis of calculation.

The petition and specifications were upon motion ordered filed and placed in the minutes.

Ordinance No. 61 relating to re-establishing the grades of Spurgeon street was adopted under an emergency clause.

Shelley & Ellingsen presented a bid for the sum of \$547 for building a warehouse on the new wharf, an I. J. A. Yoakam, Jr., offered to do the work for \$483.

By unanimous vote the council awarded the contract for the wharf building to J. A. Yoakam, Jr.

Councilman Pierce, Skeels and Lyons, constituting a committee on city hall site, reported that they had examined all the sites offered and believed the best interests of the city would be served by purchasing the site off-red by the Collier heirs on the corner of Second and Taylor streets, 100 x 100 feet, for \$2,700.

The report was, upon motion, accepted.

The Coos Bay Paving and Construction company were allowed \$33.30 to pay for extra work on the bulkhead, and also the sum of \$104.47 to pay for removing plank-ing, etc., on B street.

Council adjourned to meet July 17, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Adjourned meeting was held July 17, all councilmen present except Pierce.

Ordinance No. 62 relating to the improvement of Spurgeon street and specifying the character of materials used was adopted.

The Coos Bay Paving and Construction company was allowed \$1,080 on their First street paving contract.

W. J. Longston was allowed \$300 on First and C street sewer contract.

Council adjourned.

Notice to Contractors

Notice is hereby given that the Norway Drainage District will receive sealed bids for the construction of a drainage system in said district, in Coos county, Oregon, which will include the following:
Beginning at Station No. 0 in the bottom of a small stream; which said station is situated 625 feet north and 1350 feet west of the center of Section 30 in Township 28 south of Range No. 12 west of the W. M. Oregon.
From this station a ditch 6 feet on the bottom and having side slopes of 45°, is to be cut in a southeasterly direction a distance approximately 1450 feet to the quarter section line running north and south through the center of Section 30.
Station No. 0 is situated 1.93 ft above low tide as has previously been determined by the county surveyor, and the said ditch is to be excavated to this level for its entire length.
The approximate number of cubic yards of earth to be moved is 4222.2. All work subject to the inspection and approval of the County Surveyor, who will stake out the exact location of the proposed ditch, giving all necessary cuts, fills, excavations, etc.
The profile which is in the office of the County Surveyor shows the cuts, etc., from Station No. 0 to Station No. 3 plus 36 and is considered a part of these specifications. The balance of the ditch for a distance of approximately 1114 feet runs through the marsh and varies from a cut of 3.20 feet at Station No. 1 to a cut of 3 feet at Station No. 14 plus 50.
The right of way of all ditches to be cleared four times the width of the ditch.
The width of the ditches is taken at the bottom and are to be excavated to within two feet of the level of extreme low tide, and have side slopes of 45°. All ditches to be dug along the lines and at the places indicated by the plans, maps and survey of said drainage system now on file in the office of the County Clerk of Coos county, Oregon.
All dirt removed from the ditches shall be placed not less than four feet from the edge of the ditch.
Any and all successful bidders will be required to enter into a written contract, and give bond with good and sufficient sureties for the faithful performance of their contracts.
