Hefty swats by Howell, Oerding and Johnson failed to put the blink on North Bend. In the fourth inning—with "Pat" to bat, "Jim" stole home on a pitched ball—first, "Pats" was called out for interfering—then the decision was reversed and "Jim" was declared out. This run would have tied the score. The game was protested on Umpire Gardner's decision.

Gaffney began the battle with a single; Young sacrificed; Hull fanned; Kissam thrown out at first.

Johnson failed to connect; Lorenz died on fly to third; Byles struck out.

In the second—Connors swung for a two-bagger; Wallace reached the initial cushion and Connors third on "Klings" fumble; Slim threw wild to second, letting Connors and Wallace score; Surbeck, Heath and Maloney fanned the ozone.

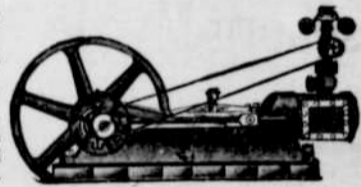
