Our Next State Senator

It seems to the Herald that Mr. J. O. Stemmler, who has recently announced himself as an independent candidate for senator from Coos and Curry counties, has some mighty good vote getters in his favor.

In the first place "Jake" is a Coos county boy, is well acquainted with all the older residents, and those who know him best are shouting the loudest for him. They say they are for him because they know he is honest, will give everybody a square deal and being of Coos county and of Coos county people, his interests are naturally with us and he will be further interested in our welfare from personal motives. And, besides, he can in no degree be suspected of carpet-bagging. This all means that he will get the votes of all these old-timers and as many others as they can get for him.

Again, Mr. Stemmler's platform is one that can and will readily be endorsed by any one except the most dyed-in-the-wool reactionaries. It places him in the middle class where the majority of the Oregon voters have stood for many years.

Again, he has the courage and manliness to say aloud in no unmistakable terms where he stands; and this is what voters are demanding to know in these days. They will support one of a different political belief rather than one of unknown policies or who is afraid to announce his policies.

Again, he is out as an independent candidate and if elected will have no political strings on him, no debts to pay, and will be free to work for the whole people. Many people are heartily tired of political deals and an independent candidate will attract many votes for his independence.

So it seems to us the auspices are favorable for Mr. Stemmler to be our next state senator.

The Daily Capital Journal of Salem, Oregon, changed hands Monday last. P. Tabor, a newspaper man from Logansport, Indiana, and L. S. Barnes, a well known capitalist of Salem, are the new owners. E. Hofer and son, A. F. Hofer, owned and published the Capital Journal for the past twenty-three years and have been a power in advancing the business interests of Salem. Its influence in political matters has served a commendable purpose in promoting many measures of benefit to our commonwealth. We are pleased to learn that the Hofers will take up newspaper work in another field in Oregon, notice of which will be given later.

W. H. Meredith, democratic candidate for joint representative Coos and Curry counties, was in the city Monday and favored the Herald with a pleasant call. He is confident of success.

The Coos county republican central committee met in session at the court house this morning to add fuel for a hot campaign.

County Surveyor A.N. Gould's Statement to the Voters of the County.

To the People of Coos county:

To advance their own personal interests, certain of my enemies have attacked me through the press of the county, in a political "deal," to discredit me before the voters of the county in the coming election. In justice to myself, and the people both friends and enemies, I herewith make a plain and true statement of the facts in the case, trusting to the fair-mindedness of each man who reads this statement to give me a square deal.

I hired my deputies at \$3.75 and \$4.00 per day straight time for any and all kinds of work in the field, for which I charged at the rate of \$5.00 per day for the time actually employed on said work, myself losing what time was lost in going from place to place, and collecting what I could, assuming all risks in collecting. The deputies were paid in full whether I succeeded in collecting the bills or not. In one survey in which the bills amounted to \$924.00 I have collected \$12.85, although I have paid my deputies for this work out of my own pocket.

The County Clerk of Coos county receives about \$1,800 per year and the Sheriff about \$2,400, and their deputies about \$1,000 and \$1,200 each per year, I believe. The County Surveyor receives \$5.00 per day for the time actually employed. The Sheriff and Clerk contribute not one dollar for the equipment of their office, but the Surveyor must practically equip his office complete before he can perform the duties of his office. My equipment of the office at the present time consists of the following: Two transits at \$250 each; one level \$125; one typewriter \$105; one blueprint outfit \$100; level rods, line rods, tapes, drawing instruments, etc., to the amount of about \$100 making a total investment of \$930, besides furnishing a team. The county has never paid one cent towards the purchase or repair of this equipment, but I have purchased and maintained this outfit myself ever since I have been connected with the office. Does any fair-minded man think that the law would require the County Surveyor to equip his office in this manner and then pay his deputies the same as he gets himself, when the other officers are furnished everything connected with their office, and their deputies are paid about one half of what they themselves receive. The law does not contemplate any such injustice, and it is supposed to be based on justice to all. I have paid out so far much more than the deputies have brought me, and if all bills were collected I would be but little ahead.

In hiring a crew on county road work it is often necessary for the County Surveyor to pay the men just as soon as the work is done, out of his own pocket, and then wait two months before he is reimbursed. I made a plain and complete statement to the grand jury of all the facts in connection with the payment of deputies, etc., and it seems to me that if they had thought that I had acted dishonorably in any way in the conduct of the office, they would have taken some action in the matter.

In conclusion, I wish to say that everything in connection with the office has been carried on in a strictly honest and straightforward manner, and I have at all times worked for the best interest of the people and the county at large.

FIEND SHOTS ROOSEVELT

ALL GOOD CITIZENS GRIEVE

Former President Still Lives—Wound Serious Though Not Fatal—Life Saved by Papers in His Pocket

Monday evening, October 14, at about 9:15 while Col. Roosevelt was entering an automobile in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, preparatory to going to a hall to deliver a speech, John Schrank drew a 38 calibre revolver and shot the ex-president in the right breast above the nipple.

Conditions favor Roosevelt's recovery although blood poisoning is feared as the revolver used was old and rusty.

Papers in the ex-president's pocket, through which the bullet passed, doubtless saved his life, as the revolver employed was the kind used in the army and made to shoot to kill.

Schrank was arrested and pleaded guilty to attempted murder saying that a vision, in which former President McKinley appeared to him, caused him to shoot the Colonel.

President Taft, United States Senator La Follette, Governor Johnson and many other prominent men have expressed sorrow and sympathy by telegrams to both the Colonel and his wife, and all good citizens everywhere are deeply horrified by the sad occurrence and hope for a speedy recovery of one who has valiantly endeavored himself to the nation.

MANY WOMEN OPPOSED TO "WOMEN'S RIGHTS"

There are over 100,000 women in Oregon. The majority of them do not want to vote. A small proportion in any given community is asking for the ballot. Is that not true in your town? What do the rest want?

Many of them are actively opposed. To put upon these women a responsibility from which they have hitherto been exempted, and which they do not wish to assume, is not "Women's Rights."

Many of them are indifferent. The indifferent male voter is one of the serious problems of the present electorate. Would you add to it a large body of votes avowedly indifferent?

The demand for women's suffrage is the demand that women shall assume an equal share with men in the responsibility of carrying the government of the city, the state, the nation. It means she shall enter with him the political arena. For it is an arena. Politics is not a conflict of opinion, it is a conflict of wills. It carries with it public meetings, public debates, public marchings and counter-marchings, public discussion of public questions, and of the character of public candidates, and all the other incidents of a campaign.

It is not democratic, nor just, nor fair to draft this large body of women into this campaign against their wills.

This is the sixth time the voters of Oregon have been asked to vote upon this question in spite of the fact that every two years opposition to it has increased, so that in 1910 suffrage carried in only one county in Oregon, and in that one by five votes; the total vote being 35,270 for suffrage, the smallest vote for it since 1900, and 59,065 against, a majority of 23,795.

The Oregon State Association Opposed to the Extension of the Suffrage to Women asks that you give this amendment your earnest consideration, and defeat it this time by so great a plurality that the suffragists, both local and imported, must bow before the will of the people of Oregon, and acknowledge that the majority rules in America.
