## Coos County Roads Association Formed

The Coos County Good Roads Assoc'n was organized in Marshfield last Friday, Marshfield, North Bend, Coquille, Bandon and Myrtle Point were represented, those going from Coquille being Mayor Morrison, R. S. Knowlton and J. E. Norton.

The following officers were elected: President—A. T. Morrison, Coquille. Vice Presidents—George P. Topping, Bandon; E. E. Johnson, Coquille; Dr. Bartlett, North Bend; Dr. Johnson, Myrtle Point; D. C. Green, Marshfield. Secretary—J. E. Norton, Coquille.

The chairman named the following committees:

Permanent organization—E. E. Johnson, George Topping, Dr. Johnson, D. C. Green and Dr. Bartlett.

To investigate the measure to come before the people at the election—Judge John S. Coker, Edgar Simpson, J. A. Matson, Hugh McLain.

Judge Coker started off the meeting by saying it was his understanding that the plan was to bond the county to make a permanent road to the interior and improve roads throughout the county providing proper laws could be passed to allow a bond issue for the purpose. A bond issue of from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 would be required, but he thought the people favor it.

Mayor Morrison, Dr. Bartlett of North Bend and others, spoke encouragingly of the project and the good that would accrue to all Coos county by the establishment of a trunk wagon road from the ocean to Roseburg. Assurances were that Douglas county would do her part.

It was the sense of the meeting, and a resolution was passed placing the association on record as favoring the road from Empire to the Douglas county line, through Marshfield, Coquille, Myrtle Point and over the present Middle Fork road as being the most desirable for a main trunk line to Roseburg, and pledged the association's support in getting this road improved. Support was also pledged for improvement of the road from Coquille to the Curry county line through Bandon and, later, for a coast line from Empire to Bandon.

Dr. Mireus announced that Hugh McLain had furnished figures as to cost. The road from the Douglas line to Myrtle Point, from there to Coquille, from Coquille to Coos Bay and the ocean made a total of 94 miles. To build a concrete base and hard road it would cost for these 94 miles \$1,488,960. Interest at 6 per cent would be \$8,937.30 and a 20-year sinking fund would require \$74,498.20 put in annually, making the 94 miles of road cost \$162,781 annually for twenty years.

Mayor Morrison suggested that bonds could be floated, probably, for less than six per cent interest.

A meeting will be held in this city tomorrow night (Friday) to which everyone is invited. The organization will be open to all who favor good roads. This vitally important subject should call forth a large attendance.

## C. W. B. M. Banquet

Last Wednesday evening, Oct. 9, the C. W. B. M. of the Christian Church held their annual banquet in the social hall of the church building. It was a very enjoyable occasion, the different divisions bearing their banners, mottoes and colors. The table was decorated with dolls dressed to represent the three divisions. Clowns with dance caps, representing the defeated, were artistically gotten up by Mrs. McDuffee and others.

The program was given as toasts at the banquet table, each number being introduced by a suitable quotation from Scripture. Mrs. Ora Maury made "the hit of the evening" by singing a "silent solo," that brought the house down. Other unusual musical numbers on flute, mouth organ, etc., were rendered. The poems and talks were also very interesting, and all went away merry and happy.
