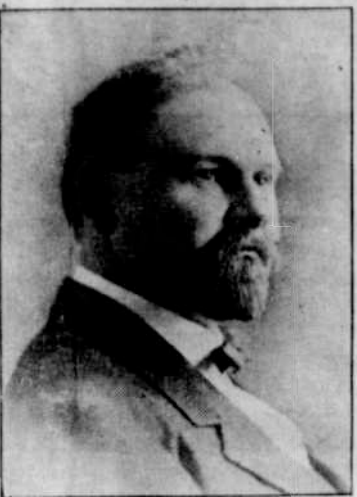

### H. C. Diers Makes Statement

### To You, Mr. Voter:

I am a candidate for surveyor of Coos county and I ask your support for the following reasons: I understand the requirements of the office of county surveyor; have had extensive experience in laying out and building roads, bridges and trestles, having been employed during a period of twelve years upon railroad construction in Washington and Alaska, two years as assistant engineer of the City of Tacoma, having charge of street grading and bridge work, and one year as inspector of street paving for the same city, which should satisfy you as to my competence to handle the work of the county surveyor's office.

I have been a resident of Coos county for ten years and am forty-six years of age. Am a life long republican and am obliged to run independent for this office in obedience to the urgings of friends, and because I failed to make the run for nomination at the primaries.

I elected I promise to faithfully carry out the orders of the county court first, and will do subdivision work for private parties if I have time to spare, but never while there is county work waiting to be done. ### MILLAGE BILL REPEALS APPROPRIATIONS

The argument printed in the Voters' Pamphlet over the signature of H. J. Parkinson and others attacking the Millage Bill for the support of the Agricultural College and the University of Oregon, contains a misstatement of facts so vivid as to demand immediate correction. Although the Millage Bill clearly and specifically repeals the appropriations aggregating \$503,000, made by the last Legislature, for buildings, equipment, etc., at the University, it is asserted in the argument against the bill that "friends of the University are trying to kill the referendum on the \$503,000 appropriated by the 1911 Legislature for the University of Oregon. If they succeed, the taxpayers will have over \$1,288,000 to dig up for the schools in 1913."

No effort is being made to secure the passage of these referred bills, and even should they receive a favorable vote, they would be automatically repealed by the passage of the Millage Bill so there can be no double appropriation.

Investigation shows that instead of increasing the rate the Millage Bill actually effects a saving on the average appropriations for the last ten years. This bill, being a measure regulating taxation, must of necessity be submitted under the initiative.

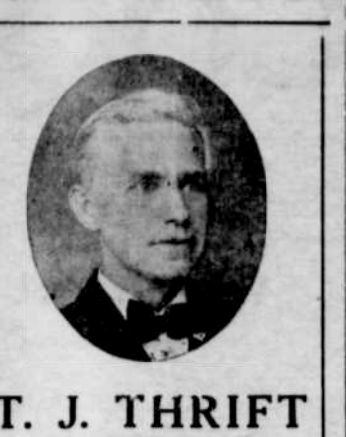
