OREGON NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD

EVENTS OF THE PAST WEEK

Transpiring in Oregon Boiled Down to Least Number of Lines and Yet Make the Subject Understood

Condon recently shipped twelve gondolas loaded with 9,000 sacks of wheat worth approximately \$14,500, or an average of 68 cents per bushel.

A pure white brant, with the exception of the tips of its wings which are jet black, was killed at Fern Ridge last week. They are found frequently in the Mississippi valley and inter mountain states but are uncommon here.

The Prairie City Journal states that five big bear have been trapped in the mountains near Summit Prairie within the past two weeks, one weighing 600 pounds.

Two carloads of choice apples have been shipped from Milton consigned to Copenhagen, Denmark, and one of the boxes, filled with Winesap and Jonathan apples in perfect condition, was sent to the king of Denmark.

A cylinder press and other machinery has been shipped to Florence for the new newspaper which will shortly be started in that city.

The Junction City Co-operative Creamery has been formally dedicated and began operations November 1.

William Reuter of Madras, who won a dozen first prizes, half a dozen second prizes, four third and two fourth prizes on his dry farming products at the International Dry Farming congress at Lethbridge, Alta., will have these famous exhibits at the Pacific Northwest Land Products show to be held in Portland, November 18-23.

W. R. Osborne of LaFayette, has now in operation a two-kiln apple dryer, which has already used 130 tons of apples, producing about 24 tons of the dried product. He has on hand 10,000 boxes of apples that will keep his dryer going to its full capacity for at least three months. The kilns have a capacity of about 200 bushels each.

From 200 to 400 high class cattle and all subject to the tuberculin test, will be put up at a combination auction sale at the Portland Pacific International Dairy show, November 18-23. As the stock will come from leading breeders in different parts of the country, will include all the dairy strains and be reasonable in price, the sale should be attractive to dairymen throughout the state.

Development work on Summer and Abert lakes has been started and it is expected that 400,000 tons per year of salt, potash and soda will be produced. A 40-year lease has been secured and more salt will be obtained from these Oregon waters, it is stated, than is taken from the great Salt Lake, Utah.

Martin Winch, a well known Portland capitalist, and a few associates, will conduct a model demonstration farm near Forest Grove, to be managed according to the latest methods without thought of making more than running expenses. It will be a show place, calculated to give instructions to farmers. The co-operation of Luther Burbank, the plant wizard, has been secured and fullest encouragement is expected from the Oregon Agricultural College, as it will supplement the work of that institution. The farm will demonstrate farming in all branches including agriculture, horticulture, dairying, livestock breeding and even floriculture.

Cookery Points

Oyster Recipes.

The oyster has been used as a necessary article of food or as an expensive luxury from great antiquity, for there are oysters and oysters, and those farmed from certain beds are as different from others as apples grown in different orchards are different.

The oyster is adapted to both a delicate palate and a weak stomach. It is believed to be conducive to sound, sweet and placid sleep, as well as to produce a peculiar charm and an inexpressible pleasure. Men in particular are inclined to believe that it is one of the greatest delicacies of the world. The author of "The Greedy Book" says that "somehow or other there is something persuasively and personally intimate in one's relation with an oyster, or with a couple of dozen oysters, for that matter—a feeling of friendship, almost intimacy." Another writer who extols the oyster as a pleasant companion of midnight hours or of midday feasts—"Then art the best beloved of the loved"—says: "The oyster! The mere writing of the word creates sensations of succulence—gastronomical pleasure, nutritive food, easy digestion, palatable indulgence—then go to sleep in peace."

Swift sent to his beloved Stella an oyster recipe. Women have sought such recipes in order to win a man by that famed easiest way. They have also learned to introduce the oyster to the table in many fashions. Nice oyster sauce gives a zest to certain fish, notably the cod. Oysters in forcemeat are like adding riches to riches. The oyster cocktail is a highly popular refreshment, with sandwiches, for those who would rather serve this of an evening than a sweet. The main ingredient for the sauce is ketchup, preferably homemade. To this may be added pepper, salt, lemon juice and whatever else will blend with these and enhance the piquancy of the whole—grated onions, freshly grated horseradish, a little Worcestershire sauce and a dash or two of tabasco.

Oyster Stew.—Put over fire one and a half pints of milk, one pint of water, one saltspoonful of salt and one-fourth spoonful of pepper. When boiling add one-half pint of oysters and cook three minutes and then add one tablespoonful of butter and two crackers rolled fine. Serve at once.

Fried Oysters.—Drain oysters, beat the white of one egg, then add the yolk, beating only a little, add oysters, season with red and black pepper and salt. After thoroughly mixing lay each oyster separately on finely rolled cracker crumbs. Have on each oyster as much of crumbs as will stick. Handle deftly and quickly. Fry in hot drippings or lard and butter very quickly. Proper tools are necessary. A flat cake turner is best, and an open skillet is desirable.

Scalloped Oysters.—Put in baking dish a layer of oysters, then one of cracker crumbs, salted and dotted with butter. Alternate these layers, having crumbs on top layer. Pour milk over to moisten whole, but not to the top, as the mass swells and will pour over.

Ideal Gruel. To make gruel successfully great care must be exercised. To make perfect gruel the required quantity should be mixed very smoothly and carefully with cold water; milk is apt to make it lumpy. When mixed it should be added to equal quantities of boiling milk and water; boil all gently for fifteen or twenty minutes. When done three parts fill a cup and serve with cold milk or cream and caster sugar.

Delicious Perch. After cleaning fish remove the heads, tails and backbone and cut into one inch pieces crosswise. Next cut thin slices of bacon the same size, arranging the fish and bacon alternately on skewers, having four of each. Brush over them a mixture of olive oil and salt and pepper seasoning, roll in bread or cracker crumbs and fry in deep fat and drain on brown paper. Serve with dainty slices of lemon and sprigs of parsley.

English Breakfast Gems. Mix well a pint of sifted flour, a teaspoonful of baking powder, half a teaspoonful of salt, a teaspoonful of sugar. Rub into this three teaspoonfuls of soft butter. Add a cupful of sweet milk, beaten yolks of two eggs and lastly the whites beaten to a stiff white froth. Heat iron gem pans, grease them well and fill half full. Bake in a quick oven.

Indian Pudding. Cook one cupful of cornmeal with two quarts of milk in a double boiler for one-half hour. Add to this a scant cupful of molasses, two teaspoonfuls of salt and the same of ginger and a little cinnamon. Bake very slowly for three hours. Serve hot with either butter or cream. This must cook slowly or it will separate.

Cerealine Pudding. Four cupfuls of scalded milk, two cupfuls of cerealine, one-half cupful of molasses, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of butter.
