L. J. GARY SUCCEEDS COUNCILMAN TRUE

The regular meeting of the city council Monday evening brought out Mayor Morrison, Recorder Lawrence and Councilmen Skeels and Leach. This little bunch of the faithful, lacking a quorum, put their shoulders to the wheel and adjourned until Wednesday.

At the adjourned meeting on Wednesday evening, Mayor Morrison, Recorder Lawrence, Marshal Evernden, Attorney Liljeqvist, Councilmen Pierce, Lyons, Laird and Leach were present. The resignation of Councilman True, who has moved from the city, was accepted and the appointment of Leo J. Gary to fill the vacancy was made and confirmed, the new councilman taking his seat at once.

Ordinance No. 75 was passed, declaring the assessment against the property benefited by the improvement of Spurgeon street and extension.

Ordinance No. 76 was also passed, authorizing the issue of city improvement bonds in the sum of \$3,404.20 for unpaid assessment of improvement of Spurgeon street and its extension, applications to that amount having been filed by property owners who wish to pay in installments. Notice of sale of these bonds was ordered published.

Man's Heart is Leaking

George Goodman, aged thirty-one, fell from the roof of the Wilkin's building, corner of Hall and Second streets, on Friday morning last sustaining serious injuries. He was putting tin shingles on the roof when he slipped and fell a distance of twenty feet striking a 1 x 3 board on a hot bed three feet from the ground. Mr. Goodman was injured in the side and back over the kidneys. Most serious aspects are interior inflammation and a weak heart. The doctor in attendance says every valve in the unfortunate man's heart is leaking. While the fall is primarily the result of this condition of the heart, the patient suffered with diphtheria about twelve years ago which also weakened this vital organ.

J. J. Stanley is a brother-in-law of Mr. Goodman and he has been almost constantly at the bedside of his esteemed friend since the accident. Other acquaintances of Mr. Goodman are doing everything possible to relieve the suffering of their fellow in distress and are leaving nothing undone to aid in his recovery.
