Statement of Expenses of Political Aspirants

Below will be found a statement of expenses of candidates at the recent election as appears on file in the office of County Clerk Watson. Several seekers for political preferment have not at this writing (Thursday, Nov. 21) filed their accounts although the date as provided by law for doing so is placed at not later than November 20. The county clerk will take action in the matter.

O. O. Lund, republican candidate for sheriff, has sworn to having expended \$133.65 in an endeavor to wear the star of authority on his huge form—and that he did donate that amount none will deny.

W. W. Gage contributed to a good purpose \$110.70.

T. J. Thrift will be assessor at an expense of \$68.45.

K. H. Hansen's expenses, in an endeavor to attain the assessorship, were 60 cents less than his opponent's, being the sum of \$67.85.

A. N. Gould expended \$27.60 in an endeavor to retain his hold as surveyor.

A. E. Hadsall departed with \$39.20 of Uncle Sam's coin with a view of using the surveyor's instruments at the expense of the county.

H. C. Diers failed to file his account for the office of surveyor.

I. T. Weekly, democratic candidate for county commissioner, made a good run under the circumstances at a cost to him of \$23.35.

L. A. Roberts, treasurer of the Republican Central Committee for Coos county, reported receipts of \$72 and disbursements of \$33.85. Many candidates contributed to the central committee fund and not otherwise.

Candidates for minor offices contributed nothing as did also a few for more important positions, while others, as above stated, failed to report, and their procrastination will be peacefully, though perhaps painfully, punctured.

To the victor belongs the spoils and local democratic patriots are looking for the postoffice job. Senators Chamberlain and Lain have robbed Mr. Hawley of this patronage and theirs will be the recommendation that counts. It will be over three years before the present postmaster's term expires and none can be found—even the aspirants for the place—who care to dispossess our worthy and efficient officer of Uncle Sam until his term shall have expired.

Thanksgiving occurring on publication day, the Herald next week will be printed on Wednesday. The Thanksgiving bird has not yet reached the editor's sanctum, but our bump of hope is big and we still entertain a merry thought of eating from a wish-bone.

Rev. Frank H. Adams to Speak at Conference

The Philadelphia News Service, 326 329 Real Estate Trust Building, Philadelphia, Pa., Clement H. Congdon, Managing Editor, furnishes the following for the Herald: Thanksgiving Day in your city will have a degree of international importance this year because of the fact that the Rev. Frank H. Adams has been invited to preach a special sermon bearing upon the great Second World's Christian Citizenship Conference to be held at Portland, Oregon, June 29-July 6, 1913. Thanksgiving Day is the one holiday of all the year that has governmental or political significance in that it is a legal holiday by proclamation and, in a sense, supports the contention of the National Reform Association that this is a Christian country.

The feature of the day's services has not been emphasized in the news despite the fact that it is regarded as a matter of tremendous importance in certain religious circles.

The sermon we refer to might be worth your careful consideration at this time because of the world-wide interest in the Portland conference which will mark an epoch in the social and religious history of the world.

Spokane Schools to be Social Centers

Spokane social center advocates have won their campaign and the Board of Education has adopted a recommendation providing for the use of any room suitable for a public meeting, in any of the thirty-six Spokane ward school buildings. Meetings of an educational, social, religious or political character are specified as permissible, but must be held under the auspices of a regular organized body. The first request for the use of a school building under the new ruling came from the Socialists.
