TRAIN BREAKS HIGH BRIDGE

DEALS DEATH TO WORKMEN

Horrible Accident on Seeley & Anderson Logging Road Near Bandon—Boiler Explodes—Workmen Killed

To Mr. Pohl of Bandon the Herald is indebted for the first information given of a horrible accident which occurred Tuesday morning, November 25, on the Seeley & Anderson logging road, which extends from a point near Prosper several miles to timber owned by the firm. While crossing a bridge, about one hundred feet in height, the structure collapsed falling to the ground in the form of a letter "S" taking with it the entire train and seven human beings, three of whom were instantly killed.

The dead—Chas. McDowell, engineer; Chas. Smith, fireman; Guy Rose, timekeeper; Clancy Humphrey, Fred Adkins and Morgan loggers.

Roland Anderson, brakeman, is the only one of the unfortunates still alive.

Nearly all the men are known by many in this section some of them having relatives in Coquille.

J. W. Huffile, a former resident of Curry county, quite well known in Bandon, was seeking work in the neighborhood and was the first man on the scene after the wreck. He met Roland Anderson three or four hundred feet from A. J. Radley's logging engine, thinking he was drunk by seeing him stagger from one side of the road to the other. On closer approach, seeing there was something wrong, Mr. Huffile walked more briskly and hearing Mr. Anderson asked him what was the matter. The reply was, "The train went through the bridge, for God's sake go for help and get a doctor." Mr. Anderson, though greatly injured and bleeding from many wounds had traveled over one-half mile from the wreck.

A. J. Radley informed Bert Dyer of the accident who started for Bandon for a doctor taking with him Roland Anderson.

Upon arriving at the wreck Mr. Huffile found Clancy Humphrey badly scalded and with leg broken, whom he took out and carried up the hill. Guy Rose was next taken out, also badly scalded and severely injured about the head and body. By this time Mr. Radley and others arrived and the work of rescue was taken in hand. Guy Rose and Fred Adkins were the last taken out. These men were all taken to the hospital at Bandon where they afterwards died.

Mr. Huffile called at the Herald office yesterday and gave us information regarding the gruesome scene, a sight which would cause the strongest heart to succumb, notwithstanding he and others labored long and faithfully to render such aid possible for the alleviation of their fellows.

Fred Wilson, coroner, is holding an investigation the result of which has not yet been made known.

This is said to be the third train which passed over the bridge.

Clancy Humphrey leaves a family of seven children and doubtless his death causes more direct sorrow among the living than any one of the others.

The sad accident has driven the dagger of despair in the hearts of all our citizens, and is the most sorrowful of any heretofore recorded in Coos county.

Church Edifice Beautified

The partition near the front has been removed providing more room and large swinging doors afford convenience for ingress and egress.
