**Curry County Cullings**  
Forty pupils are in attendance at  
the Port Orford schools.

county.

with 24 charter members.

Bids are asked for the completion

house at Gold Beach. Bids may be

Since the wreck of the gasoline  
schooner Osprey at Coos bay last  
month, there has been no vessel to  
handle the coasting trade between  
Coos bay and Rogue river, and as  
a result the towns of Gold Beach  
and Wedderburn are facing a short-  
age in merchandise of all kinds.

The stores have no sugar in Gold  
Beach and but a very small supply  
of sugar—"C" sugar at that—is to  
be had at Wedderburn. Flour and  
grain are also sold out, as are many  
other necessities, and unless the  
steamer Rustler from Coos bay is  
able to reach there soon, it will be  
necessary to live on "spuds" and  
meat until the towns are rescued by  
a boat from Coos bay.

**EVENTS OF THE PAST WEEK**

**Transpiring in Oregon Boiled  
Down to Least Number of  
Lines and Yet Make the  
Subject Understood**

The woman candidate for mayor  
of Oregon City was defeated by a  
large majority.

A Law and Order League has  
been organized at Lebanon, with  
100 members, to aid the enforce-  
ment of law.

The new library building at Port-  
land, to be completed by June 1,  
will have a capacity of 500,000 vol-  
umes and at a cost of \$450,000.

Mrs. Harlan of Corvallis has been  
asleep over 200 hours. A special-  
ist in attendance considers condi-  
tions favorable but at present she is  
no nearer being awakened from her  
strange sleep.

About \$53,820 in nickles and  
dimes were collected by "newsies"  
last year on the trains operating in  
Oregon, an average of \$2 to \$4 a  
day being made on local trains and  
\$4 to \$6 a day on through trains.

Cyrus H. Walker, the oldest liv-  
ing white child born west of the  
Rocky Mountains recently celebra-  
ted his 74th birthday at his home  
near Albany. He was born near  
Walla Walla, the scene of the histo-  
ric massacre, his parents being  
missionaries to the Indians.

The total weight of mail handled  
through the Roseburg postoffice  
during the month of November  
amounted to 85,782 lbs., far exceed-  
ing any other second-class postof-  
fice in the United States. This is  
due to the fact that Roseburg prac-  
tically handles all mail for Coos and  
Curry counties.

"Grandma" Celestia Walling, who  
was recently buried at Amity, was  
a pioneer woman of Oregon having  
crossed the plains in 1847, amidst  
hardships and perils, being attacked  
several times by hostile Indians.  
Her father died in the Snake river  
country before reaching Oregon.

Governor West has prepared the  
draft of a bill to make the salaries  
of all county officials uniform which  
he will ask the Legislature to pass.  
All counties except Multnomah will  
be designated by classes and salaries  
based on their area, population and  
assessed valuation. Because of the  
peculiar conditions existing in Mult-  
nomah county, he decided to set it  
off by itself. It will devolve upon  
the Legislature to fix the salaries  
for all.

**Law Prohibits Raffles  
In the State of Oregon**

The law prohibiting raffles can-  
not be avoided by making all num-  
bers draw some prize. With or  
without blank numbers the raffle  
scheme is a raffle nevertheless, says  
Attorney-General Crawford in an  
opinion given to H. E. Blevins of  
Cove, Oregon. With the holidays  
approaching Mr. Blevins desired to  
stimulate trade by offering boxes  
of cigars free to holders of lucky  
numbers secured with the purchase  
of cigars. The Attorney-General  
advised him that the penalty was  
\$100 to \$1,000 fine, or imprison-  
ment.
