PATRIOTISM—OUR MOTIVE

The state legislature meets at Salem next Monday, January 13.

Counterfeit silver dollars bearing date of 1879 are circulating in this section. The Herald has not been troubled with the spurious coin but those who are accustomed to transact business with coins of so small denomination should be cautious. The appearance of the counterfeit is good but lacks the "ring" of the genuine. Look well to your dollars.

Twenty degrees above zero was the lowest figures the mercury recorded during the cold wave in Coquille on Saturday and Sunday last—the most severe in many years. Jack Frost inconvenienced a few users of water by freezing pipes but these were on the outside of buildings unprotected and were easily remedied. The Northern Mississippi valley states and those of the east experienced the usual forty degrees or more below zero and many unprepared for the wintry visits of the Storm King suffered intensely. Native Oregonians have but a vague idea of an eastern winter and the terrors the blizzard carries with its hurricane rapidity. Pen and pictures are inadequate to portray the contrast in the Atlantic and Pacific coast climates. The brief period of cold here has subsided and good, old Oregon weather again prevails.

Mrs. C. J. Mahoney died at Mercy hospital, Marshfield, yesterday after a protracted illness. Her husband and her father, Henry J. Collier, of this city, were with her to the end of life. Deceased was born in Coquille thirty-one years ago. The funeral will be held in this city tomorrow (Friday) under auspices of the local Rebekah Lodge.

Rosecrans Wrecked at Astoria—35 Perished

Running before the sixty miles gale in weather so thick that her officers could not get their bearings, the oil steamer Rosecrans, bound from San Francisco to Portland, with a cargo of oil, was wrecked on Peacock Spit at the entrance to Astoria harbor, January 7. It is believed that her crew of 35 men have perished.

Two tug boats and the life saving crews have been endeavoring to reach the vessel, but their efforts so far have been futile, high seas and the gale preventing their approach to the ship.

At noon the vessel, with the exception of her tunnel and one mast, was entirely under water. Three men were seen clinging to the rigging of the exposed mast, but as the weather was bitterly cold, they could not long survive.

When the Rosecrans struck, her wireless operator sent calls for assistance which were picked up by the local station and local tugs and the Tatoosh were dispatched to her rescue. The life saving stations at Fort Canby and Point Adams were reached by telephone and crews immediately put out for the scene. The life saving crews had a terrific journey as a gale sixty miles per hour sweeping up from the south, lashed the sea into a foam and big waves broke over the crews as the life boats struggled through the water. When they reached the vicinity of the Rosecrans, it was found impossible to reach the vessel and the tugs cruised about searching for possible survivors. So far as is known none of the crew was picked up and it is believed that none survived.

The officers of the Rosecrans believed to be dead are: First Officer Thomas Mullin, Chief Engineer Grundell, First Assistant Engineer J. A. McPherson, Second Assistant Engineer Adams, Chief Steward F. Wilson, Wireless Operator L. P. Prudhot, Third Officer C. R. Palmer. The names of the crew are not available.

The Rosecrans has been an ill-fated vessel. While taking oil at Gaviota on August 27, 1912, she caught fire and was burned to the waters' edge. In March of the same year she was driven on the rocks at Gaviota and two of her crew lost. She was built in Glasgow in 1883, is 335 feet long and registered 2976 tons gross. At one time she served as a government transport. She is owned by the Associated Oil Transportation company and is valued with her cargo at about \$200,000.—Coos Bay Times.
