### Special Road Taxes Legal

It seems that the excitement over possible trouble in the road funds of Coos county is a false alarm. Judge Hall and District Attorney Liljeqvist take the view that the recent decision of Judge Barnett will not affect the collection of special road taxes in this county, which were all voted and levied according to law.

### Shot For Chicken Thief

C. B. Stokes, formerly of Marshfield, was quite seriously wounded at Forest Grove recently by Wm. C. Geiger, neighbor, who had been troubled by chicken thieves, and hearing Stokes passing in the road, fired at the sound. He got him in both legs with a load of bird shot at a distance of 35 yards. Geiger indemnified Stokes to the extent of \$500 down and further guarantees. His old friends here never expected to hear of Charley being shot as a chicken thief.

### Must They Register?

There seems to be some question as to whether the ladies must register in order to vote at the coming city election, and Mayor Morrison is not inclined to make a positive announcement yet, as the Oregon election laws are lax and blind in many particulars. However the men who are not registered are obliged to swear their votes in, and as the women want equality it seems that they should conform to the same system. The city administration will be guided by the opinion of City Attorney Liljeqvist who is still investigating the matter.

### Quick Dispatch

The Nann Smith made a new record on her last trip, which was highly gratifying to Capt. Wm. Magee. The big lumber carrier crossed the bar, loaded 1,600,000 feet of lumber at the Smith mill over 13 miles from the bar, and crossed the bar again, outward bound, in less than 23 hours. The Adeline Smith has been built to carry more lumber than the Nann Smith, and to load and unload her cargoes quicker, but she certainly will be going some if she beats the Nann to any great extent.—Coos Bay News.

### Wet or Dry

The "wet" element in Myrtle Point are trying to force the submission of the license question to the voters at the next election, while the "dry" element is fighting the proposition and the issue is not yet settled. It is said that the people of the town are in favor of the present dry climate by a large majority, while the liquor forces think that enough votes can now be mustered by drawing on the railroad workers to carry the day for open saloons. On Saturday Judge Coke rendered a decision denying the application for a writ of mandamus to compel the submission of the question at the next city election.
