### Story of Young Suicide The Same Sad Tragedy

As told by the Bay papers, the story of Erma Knorr, who committed suicide at Marshfield the first of last week, was a sad one. It seems that the girl was not yet fifteen years of age but was well matured. On Thursday night, March 27, she went down town ostensibly to attend a show. She did not come home that night, but was found next morning at a lodging house. Then her mother phoned to the father, who was at Gold Beach and he started home. He was due to arrive Monday noon. During the forenoon the girl confessed to her mother that she had spent Thursday night with one Guy Greenleaf and that he had accomplished her ruin. An hour or so later the mother went to a neighbor's for a few minutes, and while returning heard a pistol shot in the house. She found the girl had shot herself in the region of the heart with a revolver that was kept in the house. The girl died in a short time without speaking.

When search was instituted for Greenleaf it was found that he had disappeared Saturday night. Sheriff Gage was summoned and he and Marshal Carter got on the trail and found the fugitive Tuesday where he had taken refuge in a cabin 7 miles above the head of navigation on Larsen inlet. He was brought back, examined and lodged in the county jail here. He is a young married man who has been in the county for some time and whose wife and child are at Centralia, Wash. He had told some parties that he was divorced, but had told others that he expected his family here shortly. It is probable that he had told his girl victim either that he had obtained a divorce or that he was a single man as it is said that she had told a Marshfield merchant that she was to be married at once.

The body of the unfortunate girl was taken to Portland, where it was to be cremated and the ashes returned here.

### City Council Meets Twice

At the meeting of the city council Friday night the committee appointed to make an appraisal of certain city property made its report. The estimates were as follows: For the old city hall property, \$3,500; for the land back of the Nesler & Norton commission house, \$1,800; for the land back of the laundry, \$100.

Contractor Ellingson was allowed \$1000 on his sewer contract. Ordinance No. 128 was passed regulating the plumbing and ventilating of buildings.

At the regular meeting last evening preliminary steps were taken to secure dumping grounds for the city.

One hundred dollars was donated for the relief of the sufferers by the floods in Ohio.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare a map of the river frontage on both sides in the vicinity of the proposed bridge, for submission to the War Department.

Arrangements were made for the calling of a caucus at the new city hall on April 28th, for the nomination of candidates for the offices to be filled at the coming city election.

The usual grist of bills were put through the mill and allowed.

### Entirely New Line-Up in River Transportation

Quite an important deal was put through last week, affecting transportation affairs on the river, and accomplishing a consolidation of the opposition lines which have been in operation. The stock held by A. Dunham in the Coquille River Transportation Co., in which stock it is understood San Francisco parties were also interested, was bought by a number of local people. O. R. Willard, who has been running the opposition line, was one of the parties to the deal, so that the Wolverine is taken into the fold as well as the Charm, the new boat that Captain Willard has been building.

The new line-up of stockholders in the company now includes T. D. White, G. Boak, O. R. Willard, C. W. Ashton, Eck Johnson, R. S. Knowlton, Jas. Watson and R. H. Mast. The officers are: O. R. Willard, president; C. W. Ashton, vice-president and manager; R. H. Mast, secretary and treasurer. The headquarters of the company will now be at this city.

The boats involved in the deal are the Coquille, Dispatch, Favorite, Wolverine and Charm. A schedule will be arranged that will give a boat twice a day from each end of the Coquille-Bandon run. The Dispatch will be used as a general freight boat and for excursion purposes, for which she is excellently adapted.

It is understood that about \$10,000 was involved in the deal just made.
