There is a lot of truth in the observation of the Myrtle Point Enterprise, that we are getting so much information on so many different topics that we are all mixed up. There are so many different investigators and reformers working on so many different lines, and all anxious to get the public ear, that the poor public is not allowed to study any one question long enough to reach an intelligent conclusion. If the American people could all turn their attention to one problem and stay with it awhile, there might be some chance to find the answer. But they scatter too much. The trust question holds the boards one day, then the tariff question, then the white slavery crusade, then Asiatic exclusion, then the question whether Teddy was ever under the influence of liquor. The result is that the trusts wax stronger day by day, the tariff question is apparently no nearer settlement than it ever was, and the social evil is not abated. No one can say, however, that we are no nearer solving our problems than we ever were. All this discussion and airing of views and theories is setting the American people to thinking more and more, and they are getting their eyes open to many things that they didn't see twenty-five years ago. Political independence is one good result that has come about. The people see how they used to be bamboozled by the old party guff and they are no longer tied down by it. The machine is fast losing what little hold it has left, and a president like Roosevelt or Wilson can defy the bosses and keep his scalp. That is one of the most encouraging signs of the times. It means that the people are bound to get results and they are ready to back the man who, they think, is working for them, no matter what the color of his hair. And if one system doesn't pan out, they will try another until they get what they are after.

OUR SAD FLIGHT

Reindeer Good Muck-a-Muck

Randolph in More Trouble

Thursday's Record gives the following account of the wreck of the Randolph at Rogue river:

The gasoline schooner Randolph, from Portland, with cannery supplies for the Wedderburn Trading company, in trying to enter Rogue river last night, went ashore at seven o'clock. The cause of the Randolph's mishap was failure of power while trying to cross the bar. The Randolph drifted southward and was high and dry on the beach in a short time. As soon as the craft reached the beach, men were set at work unloading the cargo, and all of it was saved, except the deck load which was washed overboard on the bar. The weather was fair and moderate. The cargo of the Randolph was fully insured and the Trading company losses nothing.

The Randolph is owned and sailed by John Anderson, of Coquille, and has been in service for several years. Recently, the boat was damaged on the Columbia river bar and had to be repaired. The Randolph has been fortunate up to this time, and has plied all the bays and inlets along the beach from Yaquina south to the Klamath river.
