Engineer Wolfram, the Southern Pacific engineer, has been arousing all sorts of curiosity on the Bay by running lines pretty much all over the country between North Bend and Marshfield, and especially on Pony inlet. It is surmised that he is looking for a route into Marshfield from the back porch, without coming up the water front or dealing with the Terminal Company, to make connection with their local railroad at or near the present depot. Such a route can be found, by a little tunneling and coming in from west Marshfield. If Marshfield were wise, it would much prefer that to having its main business streets cut up with railroad traffic which would center only at the depot in any case. Other lines run by Wolfram do not fall into this plan but do corroborate, what was told to the editor of this paper over a year ago; that the main line of the Southern Pacific would run from the bridge across the Bay, up Pony inlet, through a tunnel to Joe Noy slough, across South inlet and thence over an easy route to Bandon and on down the coast. All later developments have borne out the correctness of this forecast, and those who are fond of pasting prophecies in their scrap books, to see how they come out, can paste this in; that neither Marshfield nor North Bend will ever see a through train on the S. P. main line on the business streets of either town.

Engineer Wolfram's promiscuousness over the Pony inlet territory indicate quite a lively interest on the part of the S. P. in the Kinney terminals. Twelve years ago, no one on Coos Bay could, by any stretch of the imagination, conceive of railway terminals at the mouth of Pony slough. When the Major told them, the Cheshire-cat grin was altogether eclipsed by the one that went around on the classic features of old and young. Now they can all see that no other place in southwestern Oregon can compare with the mouth of Pony inlet for great railway terminals. In another twelve years perhaps they will begin to acknowledge that there was something in the Major's prophecy that the highest priced lot on Coos Bay would eventually be in Schaeffer's addition.

A Pleasure Jaunt

He, with a party of Marshfield friends, drove to Bandon over the coast road to see the ball game on Sunday, the 2nd. They punctured a tire on the way down, but went in on the rim. At Bandon they left the machine at the garage to have the tire fixed while they attended the ball game, but the garage force were also fans, with the result that when the boys were ready to start home the tire was still flat. They left the machine and went home by other conveyances. Thursday, Wilson came over to drive home by way of this city. The tire lasted until he got nearly out of Bandon, then it went up again. However, the machine was one of the latest pattern (when it was new), and didn't mind running on a rim or two, so Wilson took the tire aboard and kept on. Before he reached Riverport two more tires laid down on him, and he came into that burg on one tire and three rims. There his storage battery joined the I. W.
