City Council

Two meetings of the council were held last week, at the first of which the new council was formally inducted into power. The only change was the retirement of L. J. Cary, who declined to run for re-election, and who is succeeded by O. C. Sanford.

The salary of the city treasurer was fixed from \$100 to \$200 a year and that of the water commissioner from \$60 to \$65 per month, either he is resigning, or the council is appointing officers were filled by the mayor by appointment of the old incumbents with the exception of city engineer. P. M. Hall Lewis having resigned, the filling of that office was deferred awaiting the arrival of F. E. Hudson, of Grants Pass, who was slated for the place. At last night's meeting that gentleman was appointed. The appointment of Dr. Cain as health officer, which has been made by the mayor, was inadvertently omitted from the list ratified by the council, but will be attended to at the next meeting.

The Sentinel has been named as the official paper for the ensuing year.

An application was made by A. P. Miller for a light and power franchise, but no action was taken on it.

Graduation Exercises

High school diplomas were presented to two girls and four boys at the commencement exercises of the Coquille schools last Wednesday evening. The members of the graduating class were Mae Lund, Ruth Woodford, Will Barrow, Clay Knowlton, Reuben Mast and Urquhart Adams.

The commencement address was delivered by Dr. George Rebec, of Oregon University, and was one of the best addresses heard in Coquille for some time. Dr. Rebec is not only a deep student but a pleasing speaker as well and held his audience in perfect attention for an hour. The commencement march was played by Mrs. C. A. Howard and the invocation was pronounced by Rev. Frank H. Adams. Gage's orchestra furnished two excellent numbers and Mrs. Eton A. Tyrrell and Frank Leslie each sang a solo. These musicians always please and the selections which they presented Wednesday evening were listened to by an appreciative audience. In an address which was short but direct and well expressed, J. H. Oerding, chairman of the Board of Education, presented the diplomas to the graduates.

China Pheasants Distributed

Speaking before the students of the state university last week, State Game Warden Finley said that he was about to begin the distribution of 3000 to 5000 young pheasants from the hatching farm near Corvallis. He said:

We will try to distribute the birds in every portion of Oregon. The China pheasant will go to eastern and southern Oregon; the Reeves and Silver Golden pheasant to the Willamette valley. We have also 120 pairs of Hungarian partridges.

The birds are hatched with ordinary speckled hens—the barnyard kind. They take better care of the young pheasants than do the pheasant hens themselves. The birds will be distributed in flocks with the hens, and when they are weaned the foster mother will be returned to Corvallis.

The China pheasant is a great advertising feature for the state of Oregon. Hunters come from all parts of the United States to hunt them. Oregon is virtually the only place in the United States where they can be found. From 500 to 1000 sportsmen will come from outside states this year because of the pheasants alone.

Died

KING—In Coquille, Oregon, Thursday, June 5, 1913, Thomas A. King, aged 80 years, 2 months and 6 days.

The deceased was a native of Indiana, and had resided in Coos county since 1876, living for a number of years with his family at Donham's mill and later in Marshfield. He was a good citizen and highly respected. For the past seven years he has lived with his daughters, Mrs. Moody, of this city, and Mrs. H. C. Noble, of Marshfield. Another daughter, Mrs. Nelson, resides in Fresno, Cal. The wife died about six years ago. The body was taken to Marshfield for burial.

Arranged for Sign

C. E. Niles, of this city, J. Milton Schultze, of Myrtle Point, and A. D. Mills, of Bandon, went to Marshfield last Friday as a committee from the three towns to perfect arrangement for the erection of the large sign which is to call to attention of visitors to Coos Bay to the fact that there is also a Coquille Valley in the county. The sign will be put up on the walk which leads from the east Marshfield wharf to the Columbia boat building plant, where it will be plainly visible from the Marshfield water front and in an excellent place to meet the eyes of all passengers on the ocean steamers arriving. It will be 80 to 100 feet in length and 15 feet in height, and the lettering will be large enough to be easily read at a distance. The exact wording of the sign had not been determined on. One suggestion is have it show

a map of the river, locating the towns, etc. The cost of the sign will be about \$150, divided between the three towns, and it will undoubtedly prove a good investment.
