Then once during the game, with two strikes on Edwards, Catterlin asked him to dust off the plate and when he complied with the request Osburn sneaked a strike across which Catterlin allowed. Clean sport that. Saved that fifteen tho.

But outside of this unpleasant feature it was a rip-snorting game, full of rattling plays and brilliant work on both sides.

Collier's wonderful pitching being worthy of special notice for he struck out 12 men and allowed but three hits and one of them a scratch at that.
