### Leach Reported in Bandon

Parties coming from Bandon this morning report that Dr. B. K. Leach, who was recently deported, returned to Bandon yesterday, and that he showed a letter from Governor West promising him protection.

In this connection, it is reported from Salem that Governor West has issued a statement scoring the Coos county officers for not preventing the acts of the "mob?" and saying that he had referred the whole matter to Attorney General Crawford for investigation.

Base Ball Contests Decided. President Kern, of the Coos County Baseball league has given out the following decisions on the protested games:

Game between Marshfield and Coquille, which came to an end when Marshfield acquired a grouch and refused to play it out, is given to Coquille.

Game between Coquille and Bandon on June 15th, protested by Coquille on the ground that the umpire had money up on Bandon, is given to Bandon on the ground that no definite evidence was forthcoming on the umpire's guilt.

Game of July 20th between Marshfield and Bandon, protested by Marshfield on the ground that Bandon played too many outside men, is called off altogether, as Bandon had more than three outside men and Marshfield played the Coquille pitcher.

Myrtle Point's protest over the game with Marshfield is still under consideration.

Trouble Over Star Ranch (Curry County Leader). Last Wednesday Deputy Sheriff Russell received attachment papers on all movable property in this county belonging to W. E. Catterlin, formerly of Langlois, but now of Forest Grove. Shares in a stock horse, a number of heads of cheese and miscellaneous articles fell under the attachment. This is the culmination of the disposal of Mr. Catterlin's lease, stock and implements on the Star ranch to Dr. Wetherbee, of Portland. It is generally understood that Mr. Catterlin traded his property on the Star ranch for a cash consideration and a 60-acre walnut farm at Forest Grove. After Dr. Wetherbee had taken charge of the ranch here he discovered that a chattel mortgage was held on the stock by a Bandon bank to the extent of nearly \$3500. It is also alleged that a number of beef cattle and hogs were disposed of after the sale. After this discovery the doctor left for the north where an attorney in Portland was authorized to make out the papers of attachment.
