a width of nine feet, with a view to eventually making it wider. The recommendation is made that the first work be done between the county line and Myrtle Point; the next from Bandon to the Curry county line, and that the work from Coquille towards the bay come later. This is in consideration of the fact that the sections to be served by the two first named stretches of road are dependent entirely on the roads for transportation and are in greater need of the improvement.

### Receiver Appointed

The long-deferred appointment of Virgil Watters, of North Bend, as receiver for the Kinney properties has been made by Judge Harris, acting on the request of Major Kinney, and Mr. Watters has qualified for the post. This appointment was agreed on some time ago, but was put off from time to time, in the hope that the deal with an English syndicate for the property would go through and a clean-up could be made without the expense and delay of a receivership. From the latest developments it seems that the English deal was more or less of a false alarm. Judge Bruunough's trip to London resulted only in his return with authority to buy the property if he could get it cheap enough to satisfy the ideas of the syndicate, and what that price would be is not given out. Major Kinney now states that the deal is all off and that the property cannot go for the price at which the syndicate was to buy. The Bay papers report him as saying that the price now is \$600,000 which is considered small by every one who is capable of judging of the value of the property. A round million would be much nearer the value today, and even that sum is small in view of the developments now going on. It is understood that there is a prospect that the property may find buyers in several parcels, instead of in one lump.

### W. S. Duniway Dead

Willis Scott Duniway, state printer since 1906, died unexpectedly at 7:10 last Tuesday morning at his apartments in Portland. Mrs. Duniway was with him when the end came. An acute attack of valvular heart trouble, said Dr. J. H. Bristol, who was summoned, was the cause of death.

Mr. Duniway was the son of Abigail Scott Duniway, the mother of woman's suffrage in Oregon, was a former newspaper man and has been prominently identified with the activities of the city and state, politically and otherwise, during practically his entire manhood.

Mr. Duniway had not been in robust health since three years ago when in the heat of a political campaign in which he was reelected state printer, he fainted while at a meeting. Physicians told him at that time that a weakened heart was the cause of his temporary collapse and he was advised to live quietly and without violent exertion. Mr. Duniway spent some time in California following the attack.

He appeared to be in about his normal condition until four weeks ago when, while accompanied by Mrs. Duniway, he was stricken with a nervous chill while in a downtown restaurant. He was taken to his home and given medical attention, and has not been out since that time.
