Next Sunday the final games of the schedule are called for, North Bend going to Bandon and Myrtle Point coming here.

### City Council

At a special meeting of the city council, held Tuesday evening for that purpose, bids were opened for the removal of the old city jail and fire equipment buildings and also to change the location of the old city hall building so as to front C street. The bids received were, John Peart \$200, Roberts and Train \$165, P. E. Drane and T. W. Shuck \$147. The last named bidders were awarded the contract.

At another special meeting held Thursday evening an ordinance was passed for the improvement of C street from the south line of First street to the south line of Second street in Elliott's addition.

### Slagle's Shop Robbed

Fred Slagle's tailor shop was again burglarized last Friday night, and the thieves secured at least four suits of clothes. Entrance was made through a back window which Mr. Slagle supposed was securely fastened as the sash was braced down with a stick. It seems that the brace was jarred from its place and the sash was then easily raised. The thieves then made a leisurely selection of suits from a number which were hanging on a rack, and made their getaway. That they took their time was shown by the number of burned matches found on the floor, and their boldness in lighting matches would indicate that at least two were engaged, so that one might watch the street. It is given out that no clues were found as to the identity of the thieves. Some months ago the shop was entered through an unfastened window and a few suits of clothes were taken, the thieves never being apprehended.

### Fatal Auto Accident

Mrs. Mary Hollafeld, mother of Mrs. S. C. Endicott, of Bandon, was instantly killed on the Myrtle Point-Roseburg road east of Sheep Camp last Tuesday, when the automobile in which she was riding turned over. Besides Mrs. Hollafeld, the auto contained her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kent, and their children. They were on their way to Bandon for a visit. It is said that the auto brake failed to control the car, and in an endeavor to stop it Mr. Kent steered into the bank, with the results that the car turned over. Mrs. Kent was quite severely injured but her husband and the children escaped with some bruises.

### Premium List Out

The premium list of the second annual exhibition of the Coos and Curry County Fair association, which is to be held at Myrtle Point during the four days commencing September 10, has been received. The pamphlet was printed at the office of the Myrtle Point Enterprise and is a remarkably creditable piece of work for a county office. It is evident that the new linotype came in very handy on the job.

### Graft

Those who think the Port Commission would graft must have a poor idea of the ability to elect honest men from among their own number. If you elect honest men and they turn out to be dishonest, you can re-call them, anyway the whole thing is under the supervision of the law, which provides that no port commissioner shall receive any compensation either directly or indirectly and monies going into the hands of the treasurer, who is under heavy bonds, can only be disbursed pursuant to action of the Board, on warrants signed by the President and Secretary drawn on the Treasurer.

The foolish arguments against the port are enough to make a person sick, but still they have a tendency to bewilder the voters.

### Auto Collision

A collision took place on the Coquille-Myrtle Point road Thursday morning that might easily have had serious consequences if the autos had been running at any high rate of speed. E. C. Roberts, of Myrtle Point, on his way to this city took a side trip up the Matt Rink creek road. As he came back to the main road Owen Rackliff was driving a car approaching the junction from Myrtle Point. Both tooted their horns but neither heard the other, and the brush prevented their seeing each other in time, so that the machines came together with considerable force. Both lamps were broken on Rackliff's machine while a couple of springs were broken and an axle sprung on Roberts' auto, putting it out of commission. Mr. Roberts says that the junction of these two roads is a dangerous place at present but the cutting of a little brush would afford a clear view of each road from the other for a distance that would do away with the danger of collisions.
