It is not known at this time just what company they belong to but it is thought they are Hill men surveying a line through to the coast and on down the coast from Willamina.—Yaquina Bay News

Trains to North Bend

Word comes from the Bay that the Southern Pacific will build at once from Marshfield to North Bend and before the end of this year will be running its trains through from Myrtle Point to the latter place. Arrangements are being made for ballasting the entire line with gravel from the beds on the Smith-Powers road. Pending the securing of the right of way direct through the Smith lumber yards at Marshfield, it is said the track will be laid around the corner of Broadway and Central avenue, and a gasoline motor car will be used between Marshfield depot and North Bend. In any case the people of those two towns expect a full-fledged street car service to be inaugurated between them in the near future.

S. P. Planning to Ship Coal to Valley Points

It is stated that the Southern Pacific is making arrangements for big shipments of Coos Bay coal to Eugene, Salem, Roseburg and other valley points over its new Coos Bay-Eugene line. The company is already making plans to put in big bunkers at the principal towns and it is expected that Coos county coal will replace the Washington and Colorado and Wyoming coal now being shipped in there, the price of which ranges from \$12 to \$14 a ton. The company will have its new Beaver Hill mine in full operation by the time the railroad is completed and is also anxious to make five-year contracts with other mines, it is said. The desire to get more coal is said to be prompting the construction of the branch line from Beaver Hill as it will tap the lower Coquille river mines.—News.
