The School Election

A hot fight is anticipated at the school meeting next Friday, when a director will be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the court decision that C. T. Skeels was not legally elected at the last meeting. Both Mr. Skeels and H. O. Anderson, his opponent at the former election, are candidates, but the issue is really the purchase of the Barrow & Strang tract. The platforms of the two candidates are given below, as a matter of news.

ANDERSON'S PLATFORM

At the urgent request of my friends and believing that the interests of the school district demand reconsideration of the new schoolhouse site proposition, I have consented to become a candidate for school director. I believe that the result of the schoolhouse site election did not represent the true choice of a majority of the voters present. I favor the selection of a site north of the gulch, and believe a satisfactory one can be purchased in that locality at a price consistent with its worth. On this platform and with the further assurance that if elected I will be in favor of doing away with it as some have said, in case we build a new school building.

PLATFORM OF C. T. SKEELS

If I am elected director of School District No. 8, Coos County, Oregon, I faithfully promise to discharge my duty in said office to the best of my ability. With a square deal to all, and no special favors to any one. And I will at all times abide by the majority rule. Right, justice and equity will be my motto. I will state further, that I am in favor of putting our present school building in the best modern condition possible, and keeping it so. I am not in favor of doing away with it as some have said, in case we build a new school building.

New Time Table

The Herald is in receipt of the new timetable of the local railroad which went into effect Sunday. The train now runs to Beaver Hill on the morning trip Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. It leaves Marshfield at 8 a. m. and 2 p. m. every day, arriving at Coquille at 9:47 on Beaver Hill days, instead of 9:00, and sailing for Marshfield at 11:20 instead of 10:50 on those days.

Body Found on Beach

Coroner Fred Wilson passed through town this morning on his way home from Bandon, where he held an inquest last evening on the body of a man that was found Saturday on the beach 11 miles below Bandon. The man had evidently been lost off from some vessel and had been in the water about ten days. From papers found on the body it appeared that the man's name was John F. Keating, that he was native of Germany, and that he belonged to San Francisco Aerie No. 5, of the Order of Eagles. He was about 48 years of age. On the body was found a signed statement, from which it appears that the man had become suspicious of his wife and that he had recently changed his insurance from his wife to a friend. From this it is surmised that his death may have been a case of suicide. No marks of violence were found on the body. Money to the amount of \$23.30 was found on the clothing.

Glad to Get Back

Chas Quigley, who has been away from Port Orford for over a year, returned to his home town one day last week. During his wanderings "Tracy" has been in Idaho, Montana, Washington and Canada, and says he struck many places where wages were good but after it all Curry county looks better than ever to him. He was in Alberta, Canada, during the winter when he says that wages were \$1.50 an hour, but with 12 feet of snow on the ground and a wind blowing so that a laboring man could only work a few hours a day having to spend over half the time thawing out around a stove. He and Ray Neely, who left Port Orford together, separated several months ago and the whereabouts of the latter is not known.—Tribune.

Those Interest-Bearing Time School Warrants

Editor Herald:—

There has been some very unjust criticism made against us because the school warrants issued by the school clerk in payment for the Barrow and Strang tract as a school house site, do not express the time to run. In the wrangle that matter was inadvertently overlooked, it was a mere oversight. But some persons, who are desirous of injuring us personally, have stated and are still stating that the warrants if issued to us in that form, would be payable at once, and that we would force payment at once and stop the schools. This statement is absolutely false.

We desire to state most emphatically that we never intended, nor even contemplated any thing of the kind. We expected the warrants to be drawn so as to run for some length of time, the resolution completing the purchase of the land distinctly states that they shall be time warrants.

And we state most positively that we are perfectly willing that these warrants shall run one, two, three, or even five years, whichever is most satisfactory to the school board. The statement that we ever thought of forcing immediate payment, or of closing the schools, or doing any thing that would result in the closing of the schools, is too false and outrageous to deserve respectful consideration.

One other matter we desire to call attention to, and which is intimated in the statement made by Mr. Anderson in last week's Sentinel and later stated openly by others in the proposition to substitute some other tract on the north side and knife Barrow and Strang if there is any possible way to do so. Voters, don't be deceived by such statements. Our tract was chosen by a majority of the legal voters at a meeting that was largely attended and by a vote fairly and honestly expressed. And the men who will intentionally, willfully and by every possible scheme they can resort to, attempt to over-ride the plain will of that majority, are not to be trusted by any other majority. Nor is this all.

These men have carried this matter into the Court in two different suits in order if possible to defeat the will of the majority expressed at that election, and to vent their spleen against us. And now after doing us all the dirt and personal injury they can, they come along and virtually say to us in effect: "We have done you all the dirt possible; we have served you all the mean tricks we can think of; we have caused you all the expense and trouble we can; we have done all the personal injury to you and to your families we can, (for whatever injures a man, injures his family to the same extent), so now you can go to— And we will walk all over you and our majority and go elsewhere and build a school house where we please in spite of all right and justice, and in spite of your majority."

And in order to carry out this infamous and dastardly plan, they spring the Kerrigan tract on the people at the very last minute as a "trap" to catch votes for Anderson. If they had desired to be fair and honest in the matter, why did they not get that tract offered, or get an option on it in the first instance and offer it with the other tracts for the people to vote on then.

This entire land matter however, was settled and has nothing to do with the election of Skeels, and it is only dragged in now to do dirt. The vote of the people on March 12th, and the resolution afterwards passed by the school board, which resolution was based on that vote, definitely completes the contract of purchase of the Barrow and Strang tract by the district. And these gentlemen know this full well.

Hence it is plain to be seen that their springing the Kerrigan tract at the very last minute, is purely a "trap" to catch votes for Anderson and to defeat Skeels. They are not satisfied with the injury they have already done Skeels by suing him in Court, in order to injure us if possible over his shoulders. They seem to still want to do him further injury. So we, vote, for Skeels, for honesty, right and justice.

Elk Damage Crops

P. K. Lewis, Lee Torrey and Thomas Barrett, ranchers near Startup, Wash., have filed damage suits against Snohomish county for a total of \$780 for ravages to crops caused by the Elk herd brought into the county from Yellowstone park some time ago.

"Three of the elk have pastured on my range for the past 10 months said Lewis, one of the trio of plaintiffs. "The animals hop over any kind of a fence and feed upon the crops. They sleep in my potato field regularly. I can't get rid of them. I have fired salt into their pelts with a shotgun and once I planted a big charge of birdshot in the hind quarters of one of them and he only wagged his tail."

Another Scene Spoiled

Many are the scenes that too thoughtful spectators have spoiled by their willingness to run to the aid of an afflicted actress, Mary Fuller of the Edison Company is the latest victim and her experience was distressing to say the least. She and Richard Tucker were sent out from Larchmont in a large motor boat, which was supposed to catch fire. A stage hand, concealed in the cabin, lit his smoke pot and Tucker, seizing the only life preserver, strapped it on and plunged overboard leaving Miss Fuller, enveloped in dense smoke, imploring him to save her. Then in desperation, Miss Fuller leaped over. So far all had gone well, but now Walter Edwin saw all his plans go to smash as a small boat put out from one of the big yachts anchored near, and despite his efforts to stop it, proceeded right into the picture. The protesting actress was hauled aboard by her solicitous rescuers, spoiling the film.

Mapmaking

The earliest maps of which we have any knowledge were made in Egypt. They were wooden tablets, on which were traced land and sea, roads, rivers, highways, etc. Marinus of Tyre, 150 A. 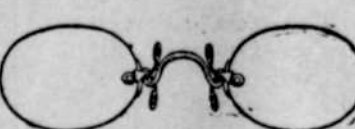
