"Bulkhead" Giving Way

The engineering theory that a perpendicular wall of concrete four or five inches thick and twelve or fourteen feet high, tied with a few small wires, will withstand the pressure of a mass of soft dirt extending from the bottom to the top of the wall, seems by way of being exploded in the case of the bulkhead recently put in at the junction of Front and C streets. Even the dry dirt of the fill pressed the wall outward very noticeably when the fill was made, and since the rains softened the mass the wall has been pressed outward at the top until it is away out of plumb, and it has become evident that unless something is done the whole thing will go over shortly. Some timbers were put in as braces, and now preparations are being made to build some substantial concrete braces outside of the wall to keep it from going any farther.

W. E. Cleghorn is occupying as a grocery the old city hall building which stands just outside the so-called bulkhead, and he has been considerably alarmed at the giving away of the flimsy affair, which threatened to sweep the building off its foundation and down the hill toward the river.

Many remarks were made by the by-standers during the construction of this "bulkhead," as to its delicate and spirituelle appearance, and prophecies were freely made that it would never stand up after the pressure of the soft dirt came against it.

The Election

In the election last week, all the referendum measures were carried except the sterilization bill.

The two university appropriations were approved by a two to one vote. The Workmen's Compensation bill was passed by about three to one.

The County Attorney bill had a safe majority.

The figures for Coos county will run about the same as the total.

The submission of the "wet and dry" question at Bandon turned out to be a farce, as the vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the wets.

In the state, Prohibition made gains. In local option elections Salem and Oregon City were transferred to the dry column. Easy victories for the dries were had at Springfield, Hillsboro, Rainier, Herisburg, Woodburn, Wallowa, Florence, Gresham, Stayton, Sherwood and six precincts in Multnomah county.

Liljeqvist Now in the Saddle

L. A. Liljeqvist received from Governor West Saturday his appointment as prosecuting attorney for Coos county, under the new County Attorney act which was ratified by the voters last Tuesday. Mr. Liljeqvist has earned this appointment by his able and energetic work as deputy prosecuting attorney under Geo. Brown. While he will now be performing practically the same work as before, there will be an added responsibility, and the salary will be more commensurate with the work, being \$1800 a year instead of \$500.

Business Change

C. A. Machon, late of Marshfield, has purchased the news stand and confectionery store of Peter Scott and has been busy making changes and improvements on the interior of the stand. Mr. Machon will carry the same line of cigars, confectionery, soft drinks etc. heretofore handled and will add other lines as he feels out the demand. He will put in a delicatessen department at once, which will be quite a convenience for the housekeepers, and he will undoubtedly find a good patronage.

Must Have License

In answer to an inquiry, Tom Hail, of Marshfield has heard from State Game Warden Finley to the effect that a fishing license is required for fishing with hook and line for tidewater fish. The question arose from the catching of tomcod off the Coos Bay wharves by small boys and others, and the same ruling will hold on this river.

Leaton is Bound Over On Embezzlement Charge

The grand jury, which was called together to investigate the robbery of the Eastside safe, found an indictment against William J. Leaton, city recorder of that town, and he was bound over to the December term of court, bail being fixed at \$5000. An indictment for gambling was also found and in that charge the bail was fixed at \$500, making \$5500 to be raised by Leaton if he wishes to enjoy his liberty for the next month.

Sheriff Gage went over to Marshfield Thursday evening and placed Leaton under arrest, bringing him over next day and placing him in the county jail.

The story goes that a large part of the money taken from the safe was lost over the poker table in Marshfield, the games being played in a certain barber shop. District Attorney Liljeqvist and Marshal Carter, of Marshfield, come in for much credit for their work in gathering evidence as to where the money went. Leaton protests his innocence, but no story has been given out to account for his possession of the large sums of money which he is alleged to have lost to the Marshfield barber-gamblers.

The grand jury also found a true bill against D. A. Curry, in whose shop the games are said to have been played. Curry pleaded guilty to this charge, but Judge Coke postponed the imposition of a penalty, placing Curry under \$300 bonds, which were furnished.

Wm. Warren, an employe in Curry's shop, who is alleged to have taken a hand in the games, was given immunity, as he was needed as a witness.
