### ARE WE ALL MUTTON-HEADS?

And now Curry county is in trouble over the late election, and there is a chance that the expressed will of the voters may be defeated by the ignorance, stupidity or wilful failure to comply with the law, on the part of the election boards of two precincts in the county. It seems as though any one who had been in the county long enough to serve on an election board should know that it is necessary that the returns should be personally carried to the county seat by a member of the board, not to mention the fact that the election board are provided with plainly printed copies of the election laws. Yet the boards in two precincts in Curry sent the returns in by mail. If it shall prove that this invalidates the returns from those precincts it will cause a reversal of the verdict of the people in the matter of a bridge across the Chetco river, as with those two precincts the proposition carried by a good majority, but without them it was defeated. Now the county court is up against a quandary, for if it attempts to go ahead with the bridge it is expected that the opponents of the undertaking will institute a legal fight against it.

It is truly surprising how men will ball things up, when they have the plain printed instructions before them. And we don't have to go to the wilds of Curry county to find instances, either. We have only to look back to some of our late lamented school meetings in this center of enlightenment and erudition. In the endeavor to elect a school director the plain and unmistakable provisions of the law are entirely disregarded; and when a tie vote occurs we calmly ignore the provision that the tie must be decided by lot, and take another ballot, with the result that the candidate then elected is later unseated by the court. Then we take a vote on a school site in a fashion we are now told with apparent truth did not follow the provisions of the law. These cases are always bobbing up, and it seems to make no difference how many legal lights are shedding their luster on the proceedings; if any one be dissatisfied with the results he can find where the law has not been complied with. It is a wonder that we get any business done.
